Ex-Monk Speaks In The United Missionary Church Sunday Evening

THIS IS MY STORY

I was born of Roman Catholic parentage in Wolsley, Saskatchewan, and brought up a Roman Catholic of the Greek (Byzantine) rite. From early youth I was leading a sinful life. Soon drinking parties, dances, sinful rowdy nights were leading my soul to perdition. Then I heard that by becoming a monk and priest and leading a monastic life I could avoid sin and be more certain of my salvation. I, a young sinner, was seeking salvation. At the age of seventeen I entered the Basilian Order of Monks, received the long black robe and an adopted monastic name of "Saint Hilarion". I was known then as "Brother Hilarion", later "Father Hilarion". How eager I was to serve the Lord Jesus Christ! I performed all my monastic duties to the last rule. I whipped myself every Wednesday and Friday night till my back bled in penance. I often kissed the floor; often I ate my meagre meal kneeling on the floor or completely deprived myself of food; I did many forms of penances for I was sincerely seeking salvation. After many years of studies and manual labor in the monastery I was ordained a priest. I said mass every morning; I confessed people; I prayed the rosary to Mary; recited my breviary of formula prayers every day and performed my penances more fervently than ever. Yet nothing satisfied my weary soul. I was heading into even deeper sinful corruption than when I was a boy. When I became a priest I began reading the Douay version of the Bible and found striking verses that contradicted my very practices. The Bible said one thing; the church another. Who was right, the Church of God? I preferred to believe God's Word and soon realized that the Church deceived me. My monastic life did not help me find Jesus and salvation. After twelve long years, I escaped from the monastery, once again in the deepest rut of sin and without peace in my soul. But then Jesus, the Saviour of sinners, took hold of me and lifted me from the depths of sin and converted me into a new man: I was born again of the Spirit. "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3).

City Mail Service Faulty, Inefficient, Jack It Up; Fleming

A blistering attack on post office operations in the Toronto area was voiced in the Commons last week by Donald Fleming (P.C. Eglinton) who branded the service "poor, inefficient" and insisted it needed "jacking up."

He said there was no excuse for some of the delays that had occurred in the delivery of mail. If the Government was determined to levy the "very high" postal rates in effect since April 1, it should provide improved service.

Frank Enfield (Lib., York Scarborough) said the Metropolitan Toronto post office was to be commended "for the aggressive and forthright action," it has recently taken in the last few months, he said, door-to-door delivery service had been extended to nearly 4,000 people.

Joseph Noseworthy (CCF, York South) asked the Government to build a post office in York township, saying he had been urging this ever since he

first came to Parliament 19 years ago.

DON'T LEAVE TOOLS LYING ABOUT

Now that spring is here and soil cultivation becomes an active industry, it is well to keep in mind that gardening tools can be dangerous as well as helpful, say safety experts of the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests. They advise: "Hoes, rakes and other such implements should not be left lying with their cutting edges upwards or placed where they are a menace to the unsuspecting."

"Pleasure derived from a beautiful garden or a plantation of trees is worth the labour expended, but not at the cost of a sprained ankle or a bruised face. Take thought when leaving a tool down; no one enjoys a rake handle in the face or the blade of a hoe in the sole of his foot."

"Carefulness is not a waste of time. A painful injury caused through carelessness may prove costly in time and money. Practise safety habits and work safely!"
