Claims Ducks Starved on Manchester Farm

A charge laid by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has brought the president of the Inglewood Construction Company into the Whitby Police Court. Stephen Feron appeared before Magistrate F. S. Elbs in the Whitby Police Court charged with failing to provide food for ducks allegedly belonging to him on a farm at Manchester. Evidence was heard in the case and His Worship adjourned the matter for two weeks for judgment.

Feron, 21 Dundas Square, Toronto, without counsel, immediately pointed out that the summons had been made out to Stephen Fahren and stated that it was impossible for the case to proceed because of this. He maintained that such an error would not stand up before an appeal court. Crown Attorney Alex. Hall, Q.C. pointed out that he had not been convicted yet "There is no question of being convicted in this court," replied the accused.

Inspector John Kusack, of the SPCA, told the Court that he had visited the Inglewood Farm at Manchester in March of this year and had found more than 100 dead ducks in the yard. He said that the only food available for them was stale bread which had been in the barn for more than two weeks. He said that he had called in Dr. Donald Christie, the local veterinarian, to examine the birds and some of the dead birds and one live bird had been sent to the Ontario Veterinary College for examination. His investigation, he maintained, had indicated that the farm was owned by the accused or his firm.

Dr. Christie told the Court of seeing the dead birds and of examining some of the live ones. "They were very thin," he said, and the dead birds "had hardly any flesh at all. It suggested improper food or the lack of food."

Constable Steve Pointon, of the Whitby Detachment of the O.P.P., produced pictures he had

taken of the dead birds at the farm.

Kenneth Coughlin, a director of the Inglewood Construction Co., told the Court that he was "not sure" if the farm still belonged to the company or not. Feron swore that the farm had been sold last November but he admitted buying \$500 of \$600 worth of feed for the stock "as an act of friendship for the owner."

Remarks about the ability of the SPCA inspector and Crown Attorney all brought a rebuke from Magistrate Elbs who ordered Feron to sit down. Judgment is reserved until May 25th.
