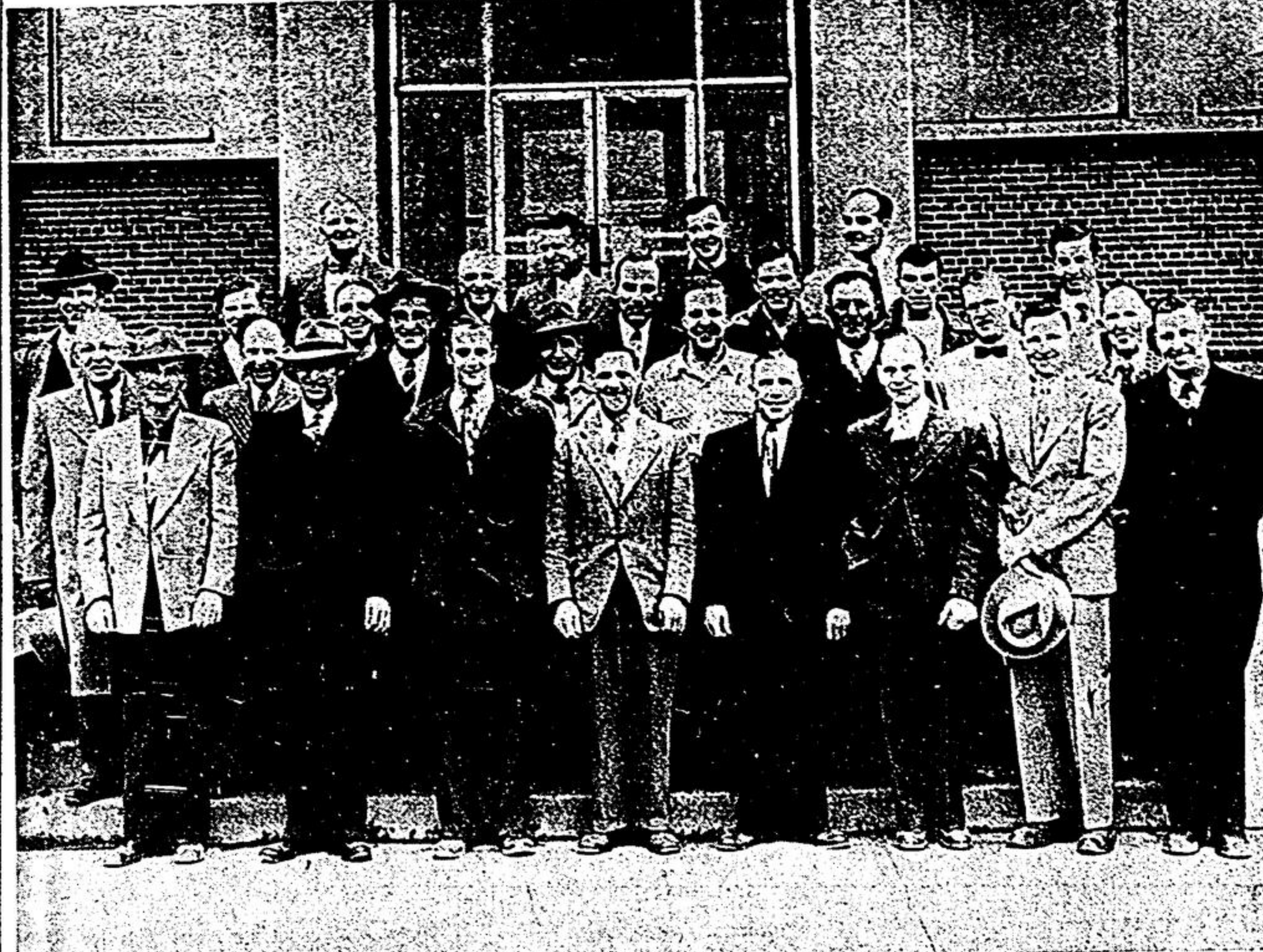

FARMERS ENJOY TOUR TO BIG FEED PLANT AND EXPERIMENTAL FARM



Arranged by the local Master Feeds Dealer, Stiver Bros., a group of district farmers were taken on a tour of Toronto Elevators Limited, on April 2nd. Under the direction of Jim Couse, local Master Feeds sales and service representative, the group completed a very enjoyable and educational tour.

A tour of the Master Feeds manufacturing plant was found very interesting. Demonstrations were given of many of the processes involved, including the pelleting of feeds, method of mixing molasses in dairy feeds and baking dog biscuits.

After an enjoyable lunch in the Cafeteria the group proceeded to the Master Feeds Demonstration Farm on No. 7 Highway, North of Toronto. This is an 800 acre experimental farm where all feeds are tested under practical farming conditions.

The loose housing system of raising dairy heifers was demonstrated on the next stop. The group then inspected the poultry unit where 3,000 turkeys are raised and processed for market and where 2,200 layers are kept for experiments.

IF YOU HOLD Third Victory Loan 3% Bonds (issued November, 1942 to mature November, 1956) they should be presented for payment on or after June 1st through any branch bank in Canada. AFTER THIS DATE NO FURTHER INTEREST WILL BE PAID. The interest coupon dated November 1st, 1954 and all coupons dated later than this must be attached to the bonds when they are presented for payment. Payment will be \$101.26 for a \$100 bond (and for other denominations accordingly). This payment includes a \$1 premium as required by the terms of the bond—plus 26c which is interest at 3% from May 1st to June 1st—the period since the last coupon became payable.
