One of the outstanding features of this divided country, according to Bishop Martin, is the great contrast between the modernistic architecture used in many of the buildings and the ancient customs and ideas of the people.

"The overwhelming Jewish population of Israel tolerates Christianity and grants a freedom of worship within limits. But the Christian missionary is generally considered a proselytizer and is not welcome." Nevertheless there are sin-

cere Hebrew Christians and 200 of these met in Jerusalem recently to establish a native Hebrew Christian Church, said the Waterloo cleric.
