On the way to Israel, Bishop and Mrs. Martin travelled through the United States, England, France, Belgium, Germany, Trans-Jordan, Egypt, Lebanon and Syria. On the return trip they touched at Greece, Italy, Switzerland, Holland and revisited England.

Surrounded by three enemy countries, Egypt, Lebanon and Syria, Israel today is a boiling pot of trouble and disagreement, said the bishop.

"The partitioning of Palestine between Jews and Arabs has continually brought on trouble like the Scorpion Pass bus massacre recently and attacks on undefended villages."

"There is constant tension and fear that the outcome will be war in the Middle East," Bishop Martin said.

There is no communication or "transportation between divided Israel and Trans-Jordan except when the pilgrimages are allowed across the border at Christmas."

Since Israel became a state in 1948, Jews from all over the world have flowed into the country. But few made the trip from America.

This influx swelled the Jewish population of Israel to 1,421,000. Christians number about 30,000.

Many of the immigrants live in communal collective settlements called Kibbutz. Land, buildings and machinery is owned collectively, he said. The inhabitants eat in a common dining room and the children live together as the charge of the community.

One of the outstanding features of this divided country, according to Bishop Martin, is the great contrast between the modernist architecture used in many of the buildings and the ancient customs and ideas of the people.

"The overwhelming Jewish population of Israel tolerates Christianity and grants a freedom of worship within limits. But the Christian missionary is generally considered a proselytizer and is not welcome."

Nevertheless there are sincere Hebrew Christians and 200 of these met in Jerusalem recently to establish a native Hebrew Christian Church, said the Waterloo cleric.

Serving at Erb St. Church in Bishop Martin's absence was Rev. Leonard Haarer.

Firemen used water hauled by trucks from a creek over a mile away.



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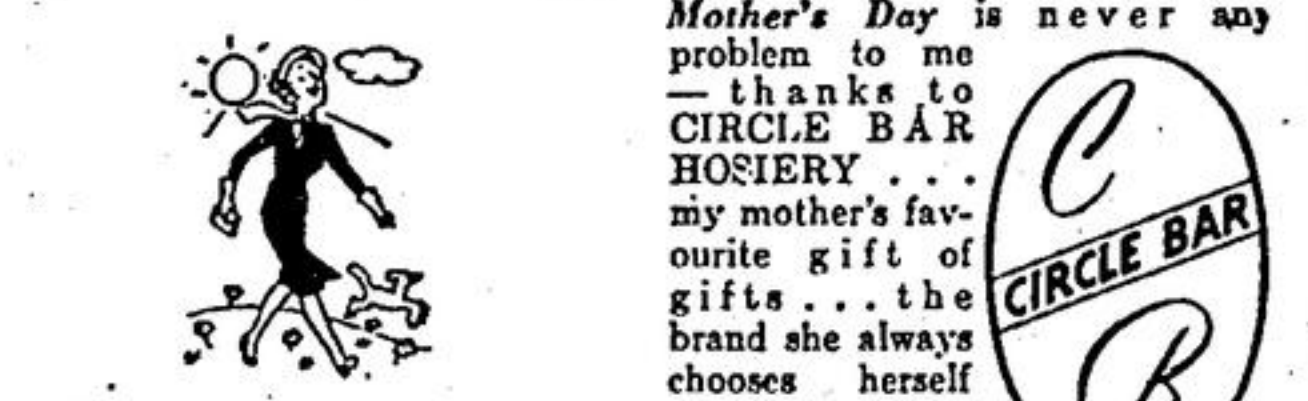
