CEDAR GROVE

Once a year the teachers and trustees of Markham Township hold a banquet in the United Church Hall, Markham. The wives and husbands are invited and it is certainly one of the most anticipated events of the season. The dinner is always delicious; there is some enjoyable music and the speaker is excellent. Since only six from Cedar Grove are privileged to attend, and this year particularly, the speaker's words should reach all of us, I am going to take the liberty of giving the highlights of his talk in this column.

The Rev. Richard Jones is a determined, dynamic speaker who speaks with force in a flat New York accent and looks more like Hollywood's idea of a big advertising man than a minister. He is executive director of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews and a New Canadian, having been resident in Canada only six years. There is so much talk at present, of many of our best men being lost to the U.S. that Rev. Jones is an inspiring example of the tables turned.

In speaking to a group whose primary interest is education, his provocative talk beseeched us to stress three things in our Public Schools which would breed in our children a deep love of Canada and enable them to go into the world proud, unbiased and confident.

He thought our Canadian History was being only half taught if our children did not develop a pictorial history of the great pioneers, law makers and soldiers of this country. Canadian images of Canadian history ought to be carried with them to all parts of the world and in all fields of their adult life. He stressed a more thorough understanding of Canadian production and industry and a pride in a government which compares favourably with any in the world.

Reverend Jones reminded us that "Canada, born of evolution not revolution, is world-

mind" and actually contains very little religious or cultural bigotry. If our educational job is teaching our young Canadians to live and work together—all nationalities for a united purpose—there will be no need for legislation to govern our human relations.

He asked that our children be given a steadfast belief in God—a God who created ALL men and expects them to share the world together. This he considered "important, essential and basic".

The evening closed with the singing of "O Canada" and surely everyone sang with a new pride and a new meaning. "True patriot love, in all our sons command. With glowing hearts we see thee rise . . ."
