The ceremonies on board the immigrant liner Grootte Beer for lovely Koojse Bol — seen centre with parents, two brothers and sister who accompanied her to Canada — were highlighted by presentation of a beautiful plate to her by Hon. Walter Harris,

minister of immigration. The plate bears the Canadian and Dutch coats of arms, inscribed: "To commemorate the arrival in Canada of the 100,000th settler from Holland since its liberation by the Canadians." Mr. Bol, 44, sold a lucrative dairy factory and delicatessen store in Utrecht to move his family to Essex County, Ont., where they will join an older sister, Rep. 20, who came to Canada last summer.

Markham Twp. To Begin Immediate Test Drills for Water

Markham Township has given up the idea of obtaining a necessary water supply from an outside source and will start immediately to tap for water within its own boundaries. A sum of \$2,000 has been set and will be charged to the area. Mr. Kirk, head of the Industrial Water Commission, stated in a letter to Council that there is definite reason to believe that water is available in Markham Township. If sufficient water is discovered, a Municipal Water Area will be formed. The Area would extend from Bayview on the east to Yonge St. on the west and from Steeles Ave on the south to No. 7 on the north. The recommendation proposed by councillors Kathleen James and Archie Little of the water and sanitation committee was passed by council at their regular meeting on Monday evening.
"I'm tired of this political buck-passing," stated reeve Alf Lemasurier, in referring to the township's persistent attempt to obtain water from outside sources. "Water is a necessity for this township's growth both from a health and an industrial standpoint," continued the reeve.
