

### DANDELIONS KILLED EASILY WITH SPRAY

The common dandelion is of European origin like the sparrow. Like the sparrow also it can be found everywhere. It thrives on any type of soil under any conditions. Although it has a few uses, it is generally regarded as a weed. Dandelions are a perennial pest to home owners in lawns and gardens, to the farmers in pastures and farm yards and to road overseers along roadsides. Seeds are carried considerable distances by the wind. Therefore the fight against them is never ending.

Fortunately, the old back-breaking method of spudding them or squirting oil on each plant is now outdated by chemical spray methods of eradication. Dandelions are the easiest weeds there are to kill with 2, 4-D. First spray should be applied in the spring when first blossoms appear. Don't let the spray drift onto other garden produce or onto lawns which contain bent grass.

Canada's outstanding athlete of the first half of the 20th century had been making his home near Stouffville on the 7th con. of Whitchurch. He had just hit a triple in the annual game between members of Parliament and the Press Gallery and he was standing on third base when he suddenly pitched forward to the ground. He is survived by his wife and five children.

Each of the new-type cars will be named after one of Canada's national or provincial parks, and the C.P.R., through the sponsorship of the Royal Canadian Academy, has commissioned 18 of Canada's best-known artists to depict the natural beauties of each of the parks in mural form, for the lounge which is situated under the upper level dome. The "Park" cars are part of an order for 173 stainless steel, streamlined cars which, when delivered, will revolutionize transcontinental travel in Canada.

### Test Vaughan Twp. Restriction Bylaw In Court

Schulyer Eggleston, Toronto lawyers appeared for the Laughlin Home Supply Co. of Willowdale and Thos. Fraser of Grant, Grant and Fraser was the prosecutor, when bylaw No. 1678 was tested in court at Newmarket last week. This is a restrictive bylaw covering the sub-division on Yonge St. at Willowdale where the Laughlin Home Supply Co. is situated. On Nov. 3rd, 1952, Vaughan Township granted the company a permit to build and operate a hardware store, and apartment above. Hardware was defined as including nails, shingles, etc., pertaining to the building trade. The firm has since bought a lot adjoining and added a lumber yard to their business. This is considered a fire hazard and so contravenes the Vaughan bylaw for this sub-division. After consulting together the township and the Laughlin Home Supply Co. agreed that the bylaw could be changed to permit the operation of the lumber yard in this area. Sending the amended bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board for their approval they struck a snag. Residents by a petition objected to the lumber yard and so the Municipal Bd. refused their approval to the change in the bylaw. After listening to lengthy arguments by both counsels, Magistrate Hollinrake asked, "has this bylaw been registered?" The answer was "no." "Can't we stop right here then?" asked the court, "if these bylaws are not registered they cannot be enforced." More argument and an adjournment until the date of June 29th was the outcome.
