but one. The dead one had three good legs and one stub. Two others have no hind legs. Another has hind legs only to the upper joint. One had the rear hooves completely reversed and another has three hooves. The other five have

deformities of the same kind. Mr. Martin intended at first to kill them, but seeing that they were able to get around he has decided to see if he can raise the litter.

The two with no hind legs don't shove themselves but take a short jump ahead, landing on their nose every time. He has had many people come to see his unusual litter.

Not much is known of the history. The sow was a Yorkshire bought by Mr. Martin's brother, Sidney Martin of St. Jacobs, at a sale. The boar was assumed to have been a black one as two of the litter are black and white.

The litter of 10 is still living. This is unusual as cripples such as these often live only a few hours.



# Restriction Bylaw In Court

Schulyer Eggleston, Toronto lawyers appeared for the Laughlin Home Supply Co. of Willowdale and Thos. Fraser of Grant, Grant and Fraser was the prosecutor, when bylaw No.1678 was tested in court at Newmarket last week. This is a restrictive bylaw coveringthe the sub-division on Yonge St. at Willowdale where the Laughlin Home Supply Co. is situated.

On Nov. 3rd, 1952, Vaughan Township granted the company a permit to build and operate a hardware store, and apartment above. Hardware was defined as including nails, shingles, etc., pertaining to the building trade. The firm has since bought a lot adjoining and added a lumber yard to their business. This is considered a fire hazard and so contravenes the Vaughan bylaw for this sub-division. After consulting together the township and the Laughlin Home Supply Co. agreed that the bylaw could be changed to permit the operation of the lumber yard in this area. Sending the amended bylaw to the Ontario Municipal Board for their approval they struck a snag. Residents by a petition objected to the lumber yard and so the Municipal Bd. refused their approval to the change in the bylaw. After listening to lengthy ar-
