Record Attendance,
Whitchurch Sunday
School Convention

Never before in the memory of those attending the Whitchurch township Sunday school Convention, held at Mt. Pisgah United Church, 3rd concession, did so many attend the morning session. All through the day there was evidence of spiritual enthusiasm.

Led by Rev. Hunking of Gormley Sunday school the panel discussion was interesting and informative. By questions and answers they arrived at the following conclusions:

(1) That 90% of Sunday school success depends on teacher, so that person should be a consecrated Christian and would be helped to present the lesson by teacher training courses, staff meetings and personally by visiting absentees.

(2) That the basic method of teaching should be using the Bible for textbook, explaining salvation with objective of winning them to and for Christ, teaching children the spirit of worship and how to pray to make lesson applicable to every-day living, also recommended visual aids.

(3) Teach the pupil to give out of his own allowance, for if not taught to give while young may never give. They should understand what they are giving for and that God's work like any other business requires money.

(4) That memory work is important.

(5) Absentee pupils are the responsibility of teacher; he or she should contact them in some way to let them know how important they are to the Sunday school.

(6) That if we could retain our visitors as regulars there would be a 25% increase in Sunday school attendance.

(7) That to avoid late starting, start on time.

Rev. Hunking climaxed all these points by saying, "Hats off to the past, coats off to the future."

Mrs. F. Huson of Stouffville ably handled her subject "Primary Dept.—and How to Interest Them". She remarked that many homes and some colleges no longer influence and teach their young children and youth to become Christians so they must look to the church.

She ended her discourse on an encouraging note: "let us never give up" and "let us be faithful".

Rev. D. C. Harry gave the afternoon and evening addresses, "Young People, and how to hold them", "Adults, Their Responsibility and how to convince them". He said about young people, "It is the age of greatest development, friendships are formed, opportunities unfold, religious instability, decisions of life, jobs, marriage. We who are the influencing power in their life, whether parent or teacher, need to be soundly grounded in the laws of the Book, and be loyal to them. Therefore we must be loyal to the church of our choice."

As to the responsibility of adults, are we self-complacent, unwilling to change our ways, give the younger ones a chance to try something different? Do we think we no longer need to go to Sunday school, thereby being no example to our school how can we ever in this life arrive at the place where we need no longer attend? Adult attendance assures financial aid and preserves home and church relations. Church going families stick together.

The Round Table Conference in the afternoon presided over by Rev. Moddle decided that the lesson might be reviewed by the superintendent who has the ability to interestingly emphasize the main points, that the quality of the Sunday school will either attract or drive away the would-be pupil, that children from families who teach them at home are more apt at learning verses.

The following resolutions were adopted: (1) that teachers teach total abstinence, (2) emphasize personal decision, (3) show by example that God's Day is a Holy Day, (4) Do not spend money on Sunday.

The solos of the afternoon by Mr. James Sleeth and songs by Zion men's trio of the evening were greatly appreciated.

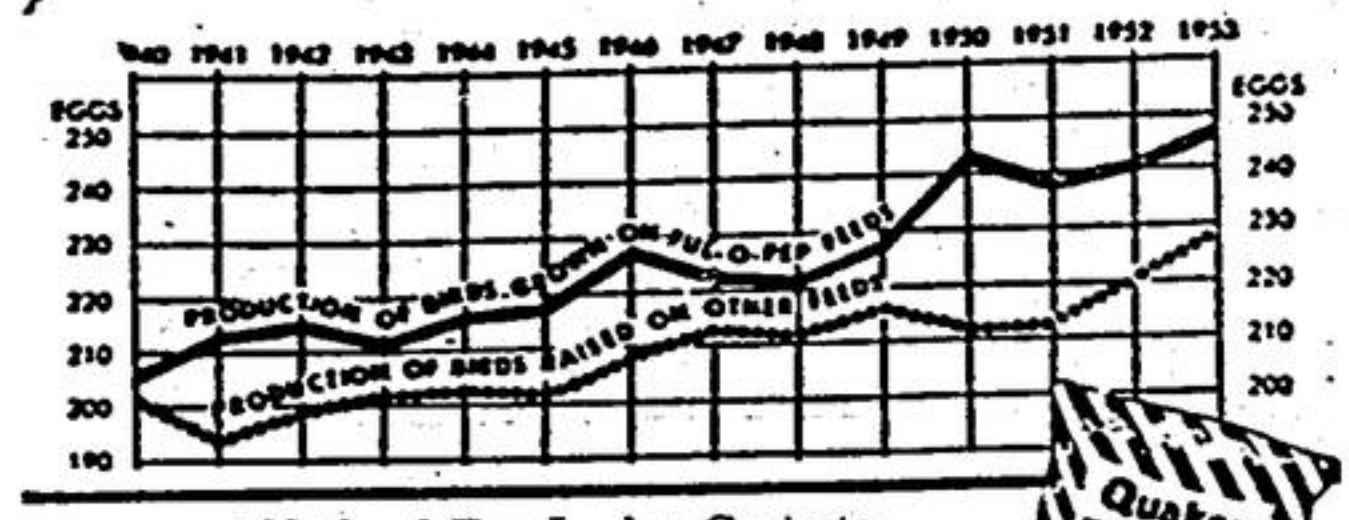
