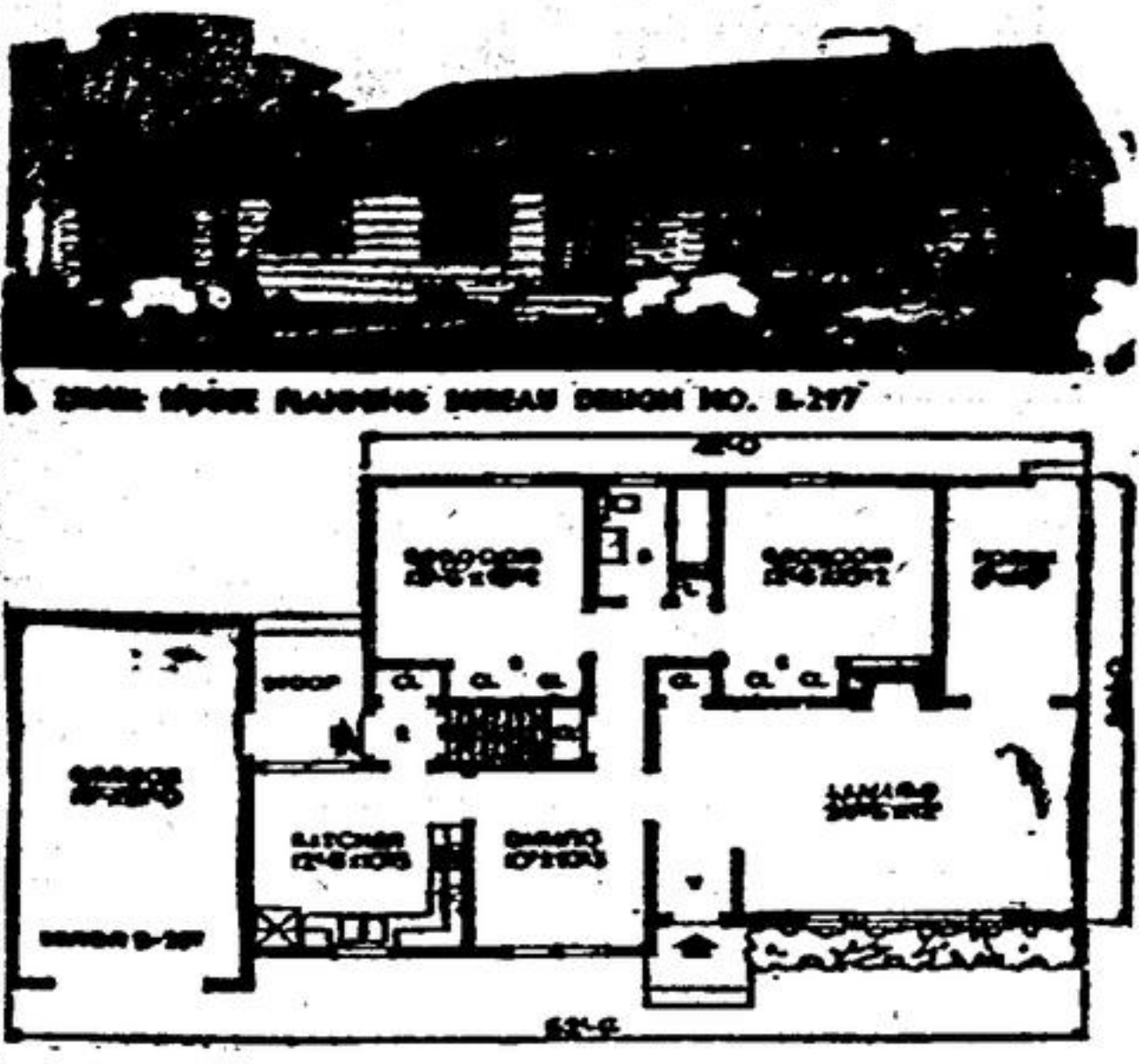
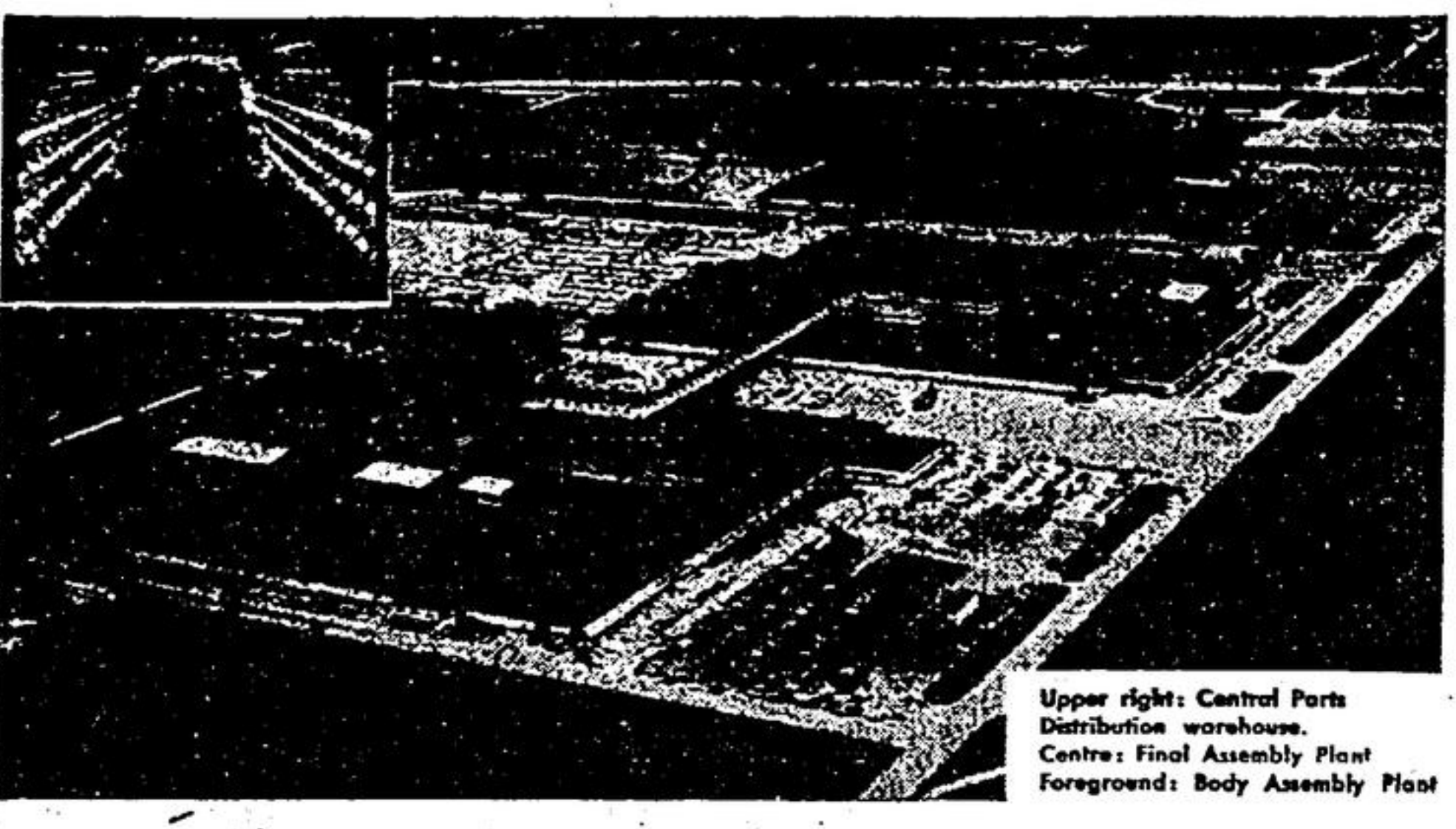

**DESIGN B-297.** This attractive ranch type two-bedroom plan also includes a separate dining room, porch and attached garage. French doors open from the living room onto the porch. The kitchen-dinette is in front of the house, with windows overlooking both front and rear yards. Wardrobe closets are used throughout and include coat closets in living room and entry, a hall closet and a linen cabinet. Plans also call for fireplace, picture window, planter, stone facing in front, recessed tub and full basement. Exterior finish is wide siding and asphalt shingles. **Fifty-Six Acres Under One Roof**

Fifty-six acres are under roof at the site of the largest automobile manufacturing centre in Canada. General Motors' new passenger cars built in Canada. In all-out production of the modern assembly plants, which cover 43 1/2 acres of the 56, will raise GM capacity by more than 25 percent to 1350 vehicles a day. The factories (shown above) to be officially opened in Fall, will produce all GM red paint drying oven, a new installation that bakes paint from inside out to produce tough high-gloss finish. The Oshawa development is one unit of a General Motors expansion program that has seen 100 million dollars invested across Canada over the past four years.
