Sox Trim Sutton in Tri-County Opener

Stouffville Red Sox scored an 11-3 victory over Sutton behind a nifty six hit pitching effort by righthander Lorne Schell on Monday evening. It marked the opening of the Tri-County League schedule.

Geo. Holborne, on the mound for Sutton ran into control trouble in the first inning and gave up four walks. Three errors in the second inning added to Sutton's grief as Stouffville piled up a convincing 6-0 lead. The Red Sox added one in the fourth and four in the seventh. The visitors counted single runs in the first, fourth and seventh.

Skip Taylor, the first batter to face Schell was a strike out victim but John Learoyd and Geo. Colborne connected for safeties with Learoyd coming out to score.

Allen Edgar, Bud Lehman and Les Clarke, the top three men on the Stouffville batting order each received free tickets to first base and loaded the sacks. Ken Schell was clipped by a pitched ball to force the tying run across the plate. Lorne Schell singled driving in Lehman and Clark and Bob Hassard smashed a high drive into the waiting glove of left fielder Skip Taylor with Ken Schell romping home after the catch. Ted Cadieux was called out on strikes. Derek Chadwick walked and Lloyd Jennings was a victim of three breaking curve balls to retire the side.

Sutton went down in order in the second inning with Weir and Hopkins striking out and Pollock grounding out pitcher to first.

Edgar, leading off for the Red Sox in the bottom of the second was retired on strikes. Infield grounders by Bud Lehman, Les Clarke and Ken Schell slipped through the Sutton infield and the ball went wild on the return from the outfield. L. Schell was given a walk and with runners on first and second, Cadieux and Hassard both, fanned as Holborne bore down to the end of the inning.

Neither club counted a run

in the third but each added one in the fourth. Dunn and Cameron slapped out singles scoring the front runner for Sutton and Ken Schell raced home when brother Lorne singled. Cameron, the only player to get more than one hit off Schell connected for his second drive in the sixth and Pollock brought him

around with a single. Three errors, a walk and two hits allowed Stouffville to count 4 additional runs. Edgar, Lehman Hassard and Jennings completed the scoring in the game. Sutton went down in order in their final turn at bat. Learoyd popped up to Pitcher L. Schell and Holborne and Dunn went

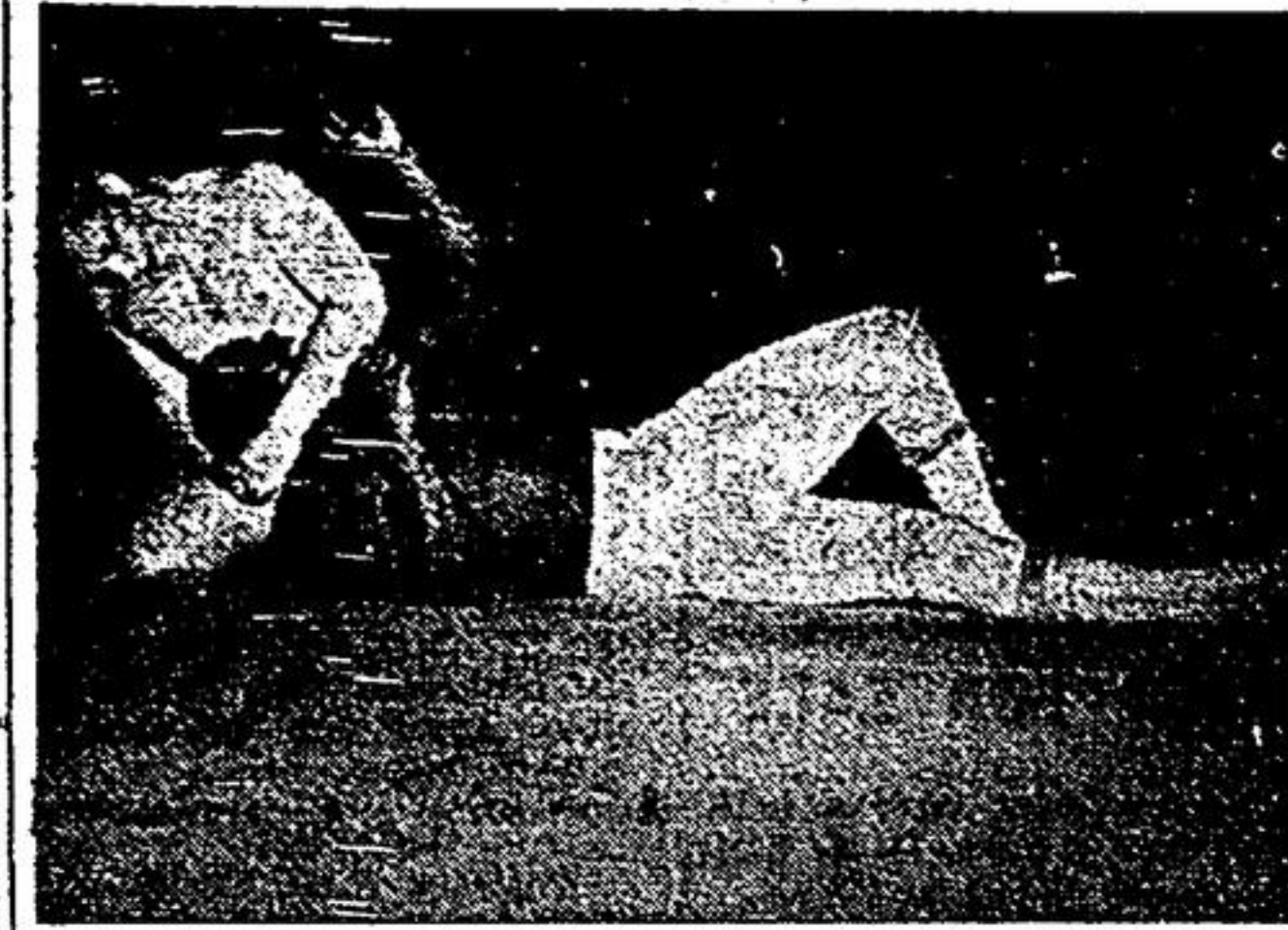
down on strikes. Aside from displays of wildness in the first inning, George Colborne, the Sutton hurler allowed Stouffville but four hits. He was given poor support as there were seven errors behind him. Port Perry will be the visitors here on Monday next.

Black Panther Thumbed from Ring

The Black Panther, well-known and highly rated TV wrestling star, turned his wrath on the ring referee at the opening of the Stouffville Arena Wrestling Show on Monday night and was banished amid echoing boos and cat-calls from the crowd. The negro grunt and groan artist was matched against Joe Greenfield in the semi-final feature event. Each wrestler was awarded a round and in the rubber match the Black Panther grabbed his towel and wrapped it around the neck of his opponent. The ring official immediately disqualified the 220-pound bone-bending heavyweight and awarded the bout to Greenfield. Before the ref had time to raise the winner's arm, the Black Panther turned on the official and beat him to the canvas with a flurry of forearm blows. The official and Greenfield vacated the ring and left the defeated wrestler to vent his anger on the excited spectators.

In the feature attraction Gori Mangotich, Canadian Champion defeated Baron Von Seiber in a two out of three falls, 90 minute time limit match. The German matman took the first fall with a back-breaker but Mangotich evened the match with a series of flips and a shoulder press. The Canadian Champion retained his title by pinning his German opponent in their third round. The Baron raised the ire of the audience with his illegal eye-gouging and hair-pulling tactics.

In the first match of the evening, Red Garner, former World's Champion, pinned Stony Brooks of Campbellford N.Y. after five minutes and thirty seconds of the third round. Garner took the first round at 15:15 with a back-breaker but Brooks evened the bout with a Canuck Commando hold. The next wrestling bout is scheduled for Monday evening, June 14th.

NORM STUNDEN HURLS AURORA CLUB TO 9-2 WIN OVER LOCAL SHAMROCKS

Norm Stunden, former Buttonville southpaw hurler and now starring on the mound for Aurora, allowed Stouffville batters but eight hits on Thursday night as the Yonge Street crew overpowered the Shamrocks to the tune of 9-2. Stunden, famous for his back-breaking slow balls was never in trouble except in the seventh inning when two hits, a walk and an error allowed the local squad to count their only runs.

Jack Sumner went the distance for Stouffville and was nicked for fourteen hits. Due to a lack of players three new recruits were sent in as replacements. Don Jackson, Mike McStravick and Bruce Fockler played well in their first tryout in the Markham League. Both McStravick and Fockler scored hits off Stunden. Gord Forgie turned in a good game at third base and Clare Fockler was shifted to the receiving position back of the plate. Johnny Lawrenson held down short stop and Ward Edwards took a turn at first base.

Neither club counted a run until the third inning when Aurora clubbed out two hits and a Shamrock infield error allowed two runs to score. Brown and Stunden rounded the sacks in the fourth and McDonald smashed out a four bagger with nobody on in the fifth to give the visitors a 5-0 lead. Aurora added another in the seventh as McDonald, the power batter for Aurora tripled and Dawson singled scoring the front runner.

The Shamrocks came through with their only two runs of the game in the bottom half of the seventh. Murray Wagg and Bruce Fockler both grounded out but left fielder Mike McStravick reached first on an error. Jackson walked and Clare Fockler and Johnny Lawrenson hit safely to score two. Sumner popped out to the short stop to retire the side. Aurora tallied three more in their half of the ninth to complete the scoring.

Clare Fockler was the top Stouffville batter with four hits in five trips. He was left stranded on base on every occasion. Johnny Lawrenson, Gord Forgie, Mike McStravick, Ward Edwards, and Bruce Fockler each connected for one safe hit.

Players Ejected From Game At Brooklin

Short stop Earl Pilkey of Claremont and "Dusty" Mitchell, who plays the similar position for Brooklin, became involved in a verbal tussle in a contest played recently in the Claremont Park and both infielders were tossed out of the game by the officials. According to the umpire, Mitchell charged that Pilkey, spiked him intentionally and the Claremont softballer denied the charge. The officials stepped before anything serious developed, Brooklin went on to win the contest by a score of 16-7. Claremont outscored their rivals 5-3 in the first inning on four walks and two hits but Brooklin's regular moundsman arrived in the second inning and held the local squad in check.

Claremont Still Unbeaten in Soccer League

The Claremont Legionaires extended their winning streak to five games as they edged the Oshawa club 3-2 in a thriller on Saturday night.
