OCAL MEN SEE INDIANAPOLIS 500 MILE RACE

Last week Geo. Wilson of Stouffville and Bill Wilson of dilliken were two in a crowd of one-quarter million people tho jammed the Indianapolis Speedway on Monday of last week o witness the running of the 500 mile race. The two men left n Saturday night and travelled the 600 mile distance in 12 iours. Thousands of people camped all night in front of the cate, along the sidewalk or leaning with their backs against the rees. Geo. and Bill waited patiently in their car for nearly our hours in a five mile lineup. Admission prices ran from 110 to \$3.

The Speedway track is of brick construction covered with sphalt. A huge grandstand stretches along the one side for lose to a mile and bleachers provide accommodation for another me mile section of spectators. The track is 21/2 miles in length. golf course is situated on the inner circle.

When the race begins, the thirty-three cars shatter the air with: an ear-aplitting noise that completely drowns 'out the owerful loud speakers which boom out the race leaders as he laps are completed. The record-shattering speed for the irst. 350 mile run was a sizzling 132.061. Of the thirty-three ars which started the race, twenty-two finished. Stops over the oite for tire-changes, grease jobs and other mechanical adjustnents took less than a minute. One car suffered a blow out ind turned around seven times on the track before it was prought to a halt. The purse for the race was set at an all-time ligh of \$250,000. Bill Vukovich coming from behind in 19th position at the start captured the honors. He had only two tops on the 500 mile course.

'Aside from the race, the spectators consumed 227 miles t hot dogs and a small sea of soft drinks. They ate \$,500 pounds f peanuts or 720,000 individual peanuts which if placed end o end would stretch 135 miles. Some 32,000 gallons of soft rinks were consumed and 20,000 packages of cigarets were old: Other quantitles sold amounted to 3,500 gallons of coffee, 10.000 ice cream bars and 25,000 chocolate bars.
