## Readjustment of School Figures - Tax Rate 73

Stouffville Municipal Council in special session this week has amended the local taxing bylaw passed last week and with an adjustment of high school figures, has reduced the tax rate from 82 to 73 mills. Since the Health Unit has now been established as a county unit for York, the special levy for this purpose has also been dispensed with and is included in the regular county levy. However, the local council had not been notified of the change and this amendment added further to the change in the new tax rate established this week.

Council after some consideration will raise their budget for sidewalk maintenance which is desperately needed and may also proceed with a survey for a sewerage system although this latter expenditure is dependant on negotiations with Anderson Associates, a firm of engineers who had visited council previously and offered to do the work.
