Truck Strikes Man At Pickering

Struck by a heavy car transport while walking around a parked truck on Highway 401 near the station road at Pickering, Howard McFarland, 38, of Mount Stevens Road, Toronto, received injuries from which he died while on the way to Oshawa General Hospital about 7:30 Friday morning. The road was shrouded in a heavy fog at the time of the mishap.

Mr. McFarland was driving his transport truck east on Highway 401, and stopped and parked it just off the highway where the station road at Pickering intersects it. He got out of the truck and walked around it, just as a car transport, driven by Herb Pearsall of Toronto, came along. The transport struck him, inflicting critical injuries.

The injured man was taken to the Ajax and Pickering General Hospital, and from there was transported to the Oshawa General Hospital. He was dead, however, before arriving there. The accident was investigated by Sgt. Charles Hefferon and Constable S. Roberts of the Ontario Provincial Police.
