

Irish Guards Band To Play At the C.N.E.

The Canadian National Exhibition bandshell will echo the music this year of a band which makes its first appearance at the Exhibition in almost half a century.

The Band of the Irish Guards, formed in 1900 by Queen Victoria to commemorate the bravery of Irish regiments in the South African Campaigns, toured Canada in 1935 and played at the Exhibition that year.

In the fifty years that have passed the Irish Guards Band, touring the world many times, never once coincided its schedule with the two-week Ex. This year the Band has planned an outstanding program for its repeat performance at the world's largest annual exposition.

During the war years the Band travelled to many theatres of war, giving concerts to the troops, and toured Palestine recently during the disturbances in that country.

Many past and present members of the Band are members of famous London orchestras, including the BBC Symphony Orchestra, the London Philharmonic Orchestra and the London Symphony Orchestra.

The present Director of Music, Capt. C. H. Jaeger, originally joined the Army as a Band boy in 1927. He graduated through Kneller Hall and was appointed Bandmaster of the 4th Queen's Own Hussars. Subsequently Director of Music at the Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst, he succeeded to the Irish Guards Band in 1949, and is the youngest Director of Music the Food Guards have ever had.
