## EDITOR'S MAIL

Dear Sir:

With reference to the announcement which appears elsewhere in this paper, your Stouffville bank wishes to assure its customers that the decision to remain closed on Saturdays does not represent a wish on its part to curtail its services to the public. Actually under the new arrangement of hours, the Bank will be open to the public two hours more each week than at present. This is because it will remain open on Wednesdays until 3 p.m. as compared with 12.30 p.m. at present and on Fridays, in addition to the usual hours, it will be open from 4.30 to 6 p.m.

The re-arrangement of hours is a development of the plan started by industry a number of years ago in the larger cities to give their employees Saturday off. Since then it has spread, as the result of pressure from employees, to government services, to large stores and to most lines of commercial enterprise in the cities and towns and is now reaching out to the villages.

The banks were slow to follow industry and did so only when staff, particularly city members, commenced to leave in such numbers that a serious situation developed. The banks, at first, closed only in the large cities but as the movement spread through industry to smaller places, the banks, with some reluctance, followed.

The banks at Markham and Unionville will adopt Saturday closing on the same date as in Stouffville and commencing 11th September there will be no places between here and Toronto where banks are open on Saturdays. Banks at Thornhill, Lansing and Agincourt, have been closed on Saturdays for some time and more recently those in Richmond Hill.

However, it is also noticeable that our younger farmers going for the more modern methods of farming, the use of combines, etc., while the older men in the business prefer to remain with the long-established rule of shocking their grain and threshing it from the sheaves.

## Dr. Jessie Brodie Returns from Baghdad, India

Dr. Jessie Brodie who was born and raised at Bethesda, has just returned from Baghdad, India, where she has been engaged for the last two years organizing home economics in a girls' college. She returned via the continent and Paris and along with her mother, Mrs. Geo. Brodie and sister, Miss Lillian, visited Miss Janet Brodie here in Stouffville a week ago. Mrs. Brodie and Miss Lillian reside in Willowdale.

Dr. Brodie describes her last two years in India in these words, "an extremely interesting experience but no glamor job."

"It was an experience I would not have missed for anything," says the former director of the School of Household Science, University of Toronto, for 17 years, who was appointed two years ago by the Food and Agriculture Organization of United Nations to organize home economics in a girls' college over there.

"FAO was interested in improving the level of nutrition—one way of doing this was through home economics," said Dr. Brodie, whose special field was food and nutrition.

Alia College, named for the mother of the present King Faisal II (who is much interested in women's work in general and their education in particular) is a college at university level and will become part of the University of Baghdad shortly. A bill providing for it has already gone through parliament, she explained. It was chosen because the Ministry of Education thought more home economics should be taught in secondary schools, and there was no training place to prepare native teachers for this work. There are co-educational colleges, but Moslem girls would not be allowed to go to them.
