TOWNSHIP OF MARKHAM DRIVEWAY CULVERTS

It has been noticed that several people in the Township have built retaining walls on the ends of their driveway culvert. This practice is frowned upon for several reasons:

1. Our snow plows might hit them in the winter and thus put the equipment out of commission just when it is needed.
2. Loose stones from them might get knocked into the ditch and form a blockage.
3. When it is necessary to remove drive culverts, in order to re-grade the ditch, they embarrass both the Township and the owner involved.

Before constructing such retaining walls or doing any such work on the road allowance please consult the Road Superintendent.

Also note that the Township has passed a by-law governing the construction of driveway culverts. All new culverts, including replacements, should be installed in accordance with the provisions of the by-law.

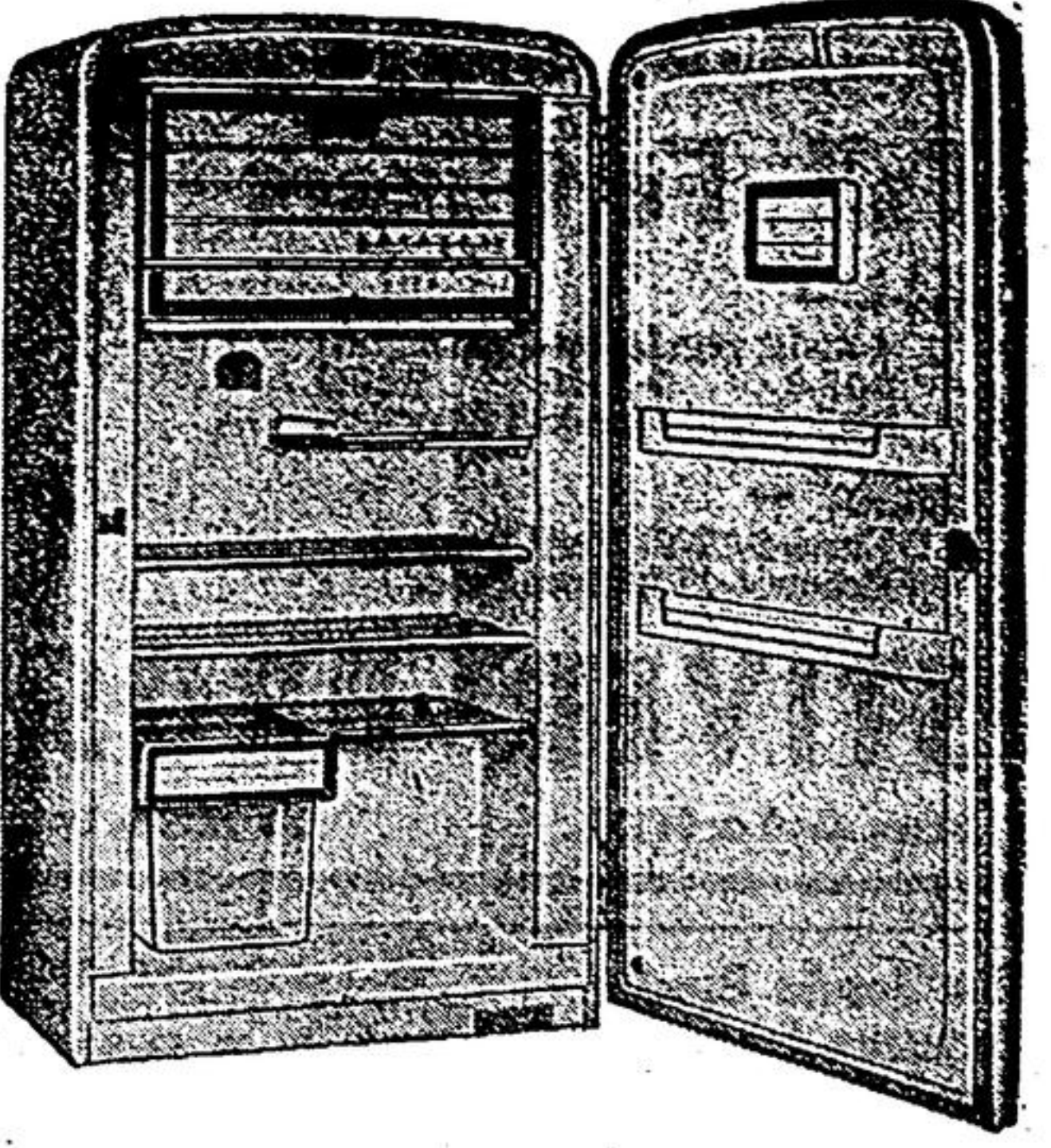
