Council Approves Proposed Ward Boundaries

Markham Township Council approved on Monday night of proposed boundaries for the three wards into which the municipality is to be divided for electoral purposes. The new ward layout is being prepared in map form and will be sent to all ratepayers prior to election day. Ward One is bounded on the west by Yonge St. and on the east by Con. 1. It will contain polling subdivisions Nos. 1, 2, 3A, 3B, 4, 5 and 6. Ward Two is bounded on the west by Con. 1 and on the east by Con. 6, including Unionville and contains polling subdivisions 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11. Ward 3 is bounded on the west by Con. 6 and on the east by the east townline and contains polling subdivisions 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17.

Eight bids were received for the \$65,000 debentures being issued by Markham for an addition to the Henderson Ave. public school. The successful bid at 4 1/4% was the R. A. Daly Co. and the price of the bonds \$12,072.

The deceased was born at Baker Hill, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Seneca Baker. Following her marriage to the late Herbert Barnes, the couple resided in Cookstown, later taking up residence at Baker Hill and Stouffville. Her husband passed away twenty years ago. She was in her 80th year.

The late Mrs. Barnes was a very talented pianist and organist. She played the organ in the Baker Hill Baptist Church for fifty years and conducted a piano class for a similar length of time. An enthusiastic church worker, the deceased also conducted a Sunday School class for a number of years.

She leaves to mourn her passing four brothers, Oscar Baker of Welland, Morgan Baker of King, Bert Baker and Eugene Baker, both of Baker Hill, and three sisters, Mrs. Zillah Gilbert of Stouffville and Mrs. Tom Simpson and Mrs. Milton Cook of Newmarket.
