The Agincourt fireballer gave up only six hits in nine innings as Markham Aces bowed out of the OASA playoffs three games to two.

Markham appeared to be off to a winning start in the early innings as they broke into a 3-0 lead. The Aces' first sacker Monte Holman singled in the first inning with the Petch brothers, parked on second and third to score two runs.

In the third inning Agincourt's long ball hitters, Evans and Dawes, slapped the ball into the deep outfield and accounted for five runs. The Markham fielders seemed to contract a serious case of the jitters after their lead melted away and they failed to give O'Neill their usual airtight support.

The Agincourt infield showed plenty of snap and the addition of Mark Mills to the second base position added further strength to the squad. Monte Holman and Bob Petch each clipped Dawes for two safeties. Procenko and Vidler accounted for Markham's other hits.
