Council took the view that the school board was at least partially responsible for these children and the operation of such a school by a private group was only lessening their responsibility.

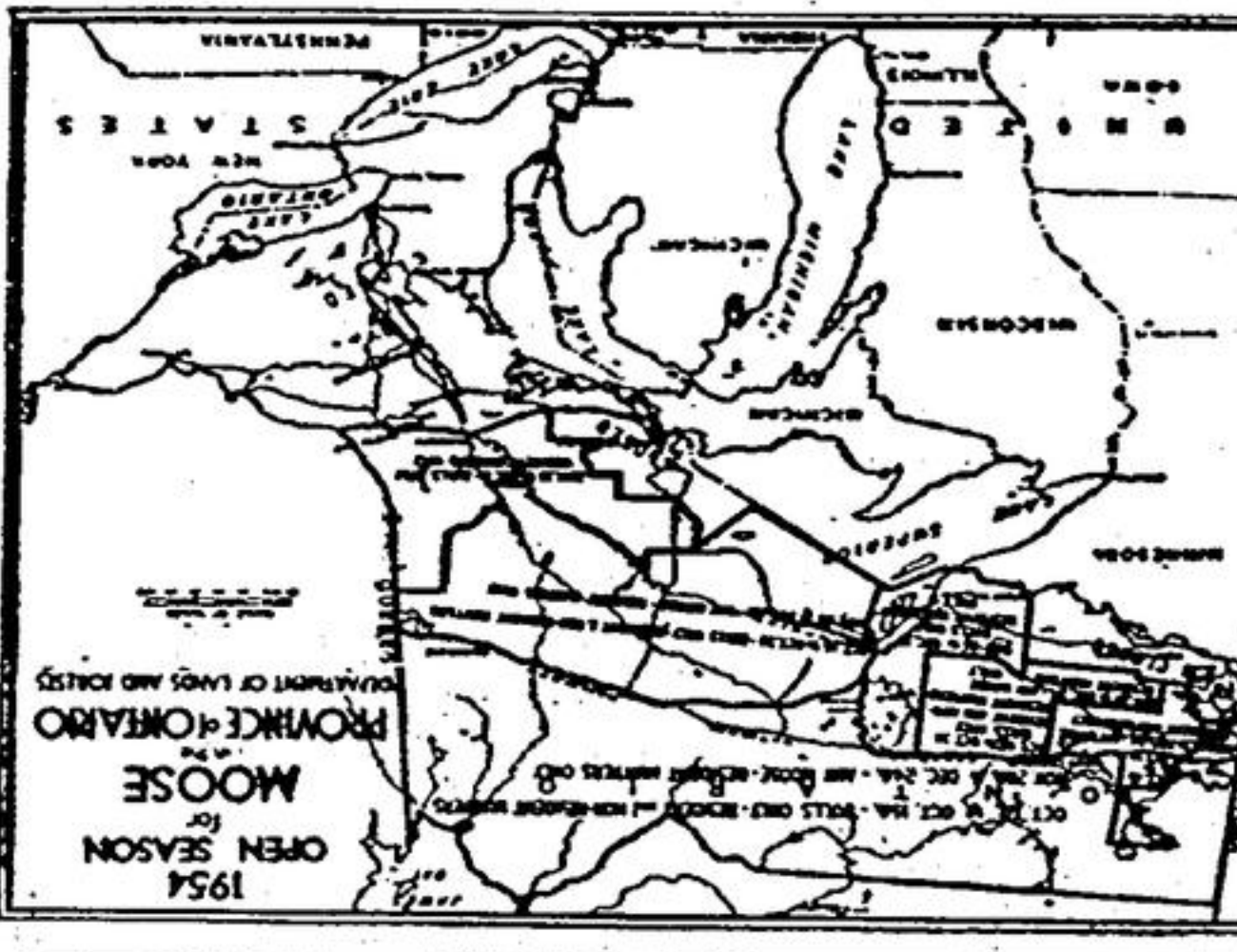
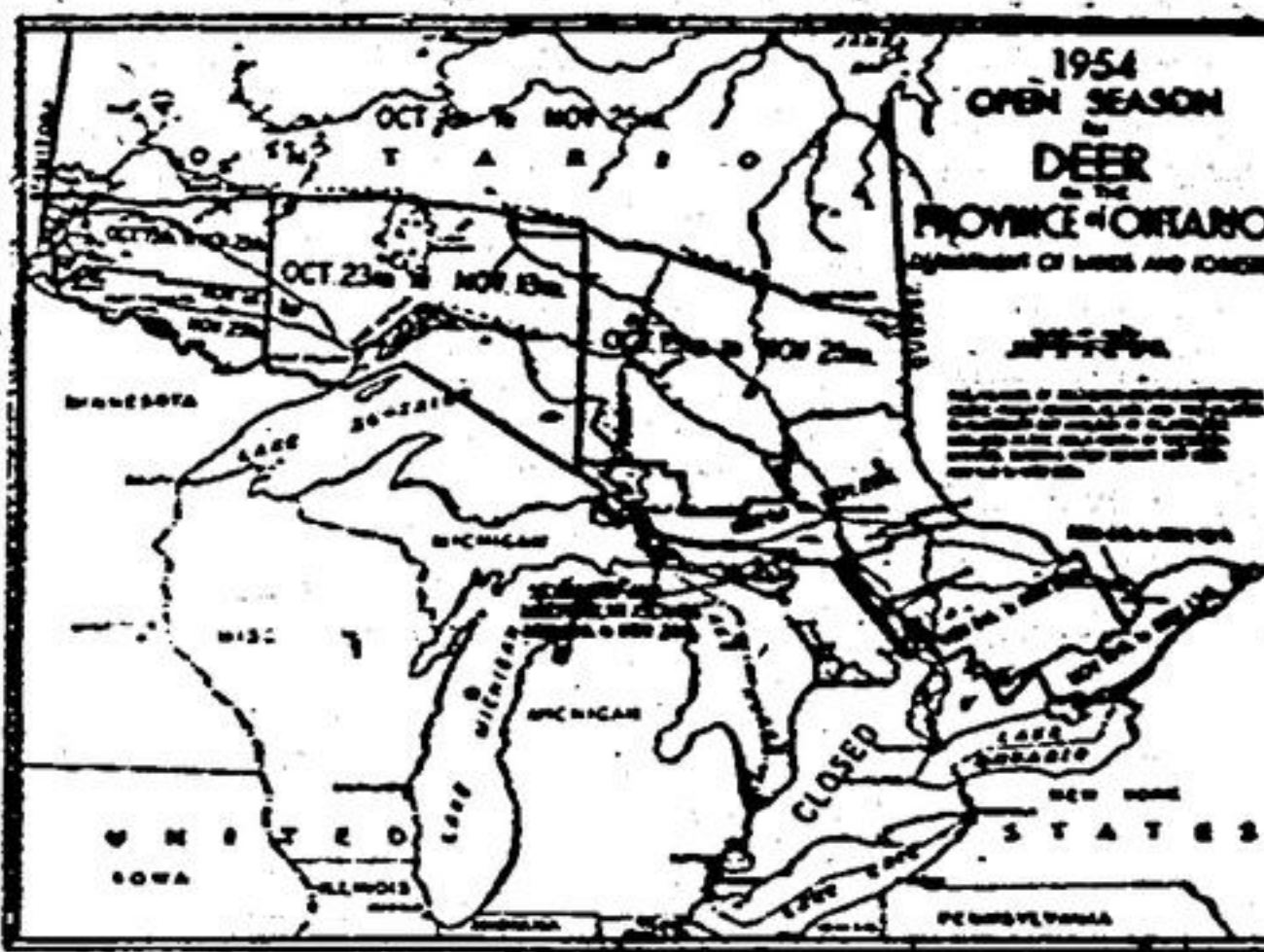
"The building went up for sale just as soon as we asked for it," declared Mrs. Swindle. "The School Act states that the Board should secure accommodation for these children," she said.

"Well, we're morally behind you and I can't imagine why the Board would turn you down, in fact the school inspector told me he would approve of the use of this building, and I suggest you go back to the Board and make another appeal," stated reeve LeMasurier in summing up the discussion. This the delegation agreed to do.
