Press and Radio Have Preview of Plowing Match Preparations

Representatives of press, radio and television this week were given an opportunity of taking a peep behind the scenes to evaluate for themselves the preparations that are being made to make this year's International Plowing Match—October 12 to 15—the greatest in the forty-one years of the Ontario Plowmen's Association's history. After a visit to the site of the Match at the John Randall and neighboring farms on No. 7 highway near Braslau, the group of some 20 writers and broadcasters came away fully convinced that the slogan of the local committee "See More in '54" was no idle boast. Under the guidance of A. W. Sandrock, Chairman of the Waterloo County Committee and F. A. Lashley, Secretary-Manager of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, the group viewed the location of "tented city", visited the vast parking areas that have been provided, and heard a report from various sub-committees on the arrangements that are being made to provide every comfort for visitor and exhibitor alike. Later in the day they had the opportunity of visiting the farm of Arnold Rife where Junior Farmer representatives and the Mayors of the six Waterloo County Municipalities were getting in a little practice for the forthcoming event. Tuning up for the Mayor's challenge class in which 30 entries are expected, were Mayor Dr. C. E. Gibson, Elmira; Mayor Ford Wilson, Preston; Mayor Elmer Goebel, Hespeler; Mayor William Anderson, Galt; Mayor Frank Bauer, Waterloo, and Mayor Don Webster of Kitchener. All the mayors were congratulated on their fine showing by R. A. "Sandy" Forsyth, Agricultural Representative for Waterloo, who acted as guide for the day. Mr. Lashley told the visitors that there was no doubt that all previous I.P.M. records would be broken. That was already evident by the enthusiasm and hard work that had been put into the preparations by the local committee. He pointed out that this year would see the largest display of exhibits in the history of the Match. Over 200 firms interested in displaying and demonstrating various kinds of farm equipment and some 50 food caterers had already purchased space. Over two miles of frontage will be provided to house "tented city". "Tented City" will have the equivalent in services of a municipality. Hydro, water, garbage disposal, washrooms, telephones, teletype, newspaper, radio and TV services being available. Parking space will be ample and convenient with a Bailey Bridge being erected over the highway for the convenience and safety of pedestrians. Widening interest in the annual match is indicated by the fact that already entries have been received from distant places. British Columbia will have two entrants in the Canadian Championship Class from which two plowmen will be selected to compete at the World Match in Sweden next year. Manitoba and New York State will also be represented. Among the most important and keenly contested events will be the Mayors' Class on the opening day, October 12th. It is expected this will draw a record entry in view of the recent challenge offered mayors of other cities and towns by the six mayors in Waterloo County, all of whom intend to plow. The Ontario Championship Class scheduled for October 13th will draw the top plowmen in the province. From this will be picked two of the best to enter the Canadian class on the 14th. The Secondary School Class, also on the 14th, will interest at least 20 schools. Two pupils make up a team and their entry is made by the school principal. The inter-county class will also be keenly contested. The entry list is comprised of teams of boys chosen by the Agricultural Representatives. This will be one of the important classes on the last day, October 15th. Incidentally there are 48 classes in the prize list. This is an average of 12 per day. Competitions in farm welding will be held on each of the four days. This will be open to bonafide farmers and farmer's sons. All equipment will be supplied
