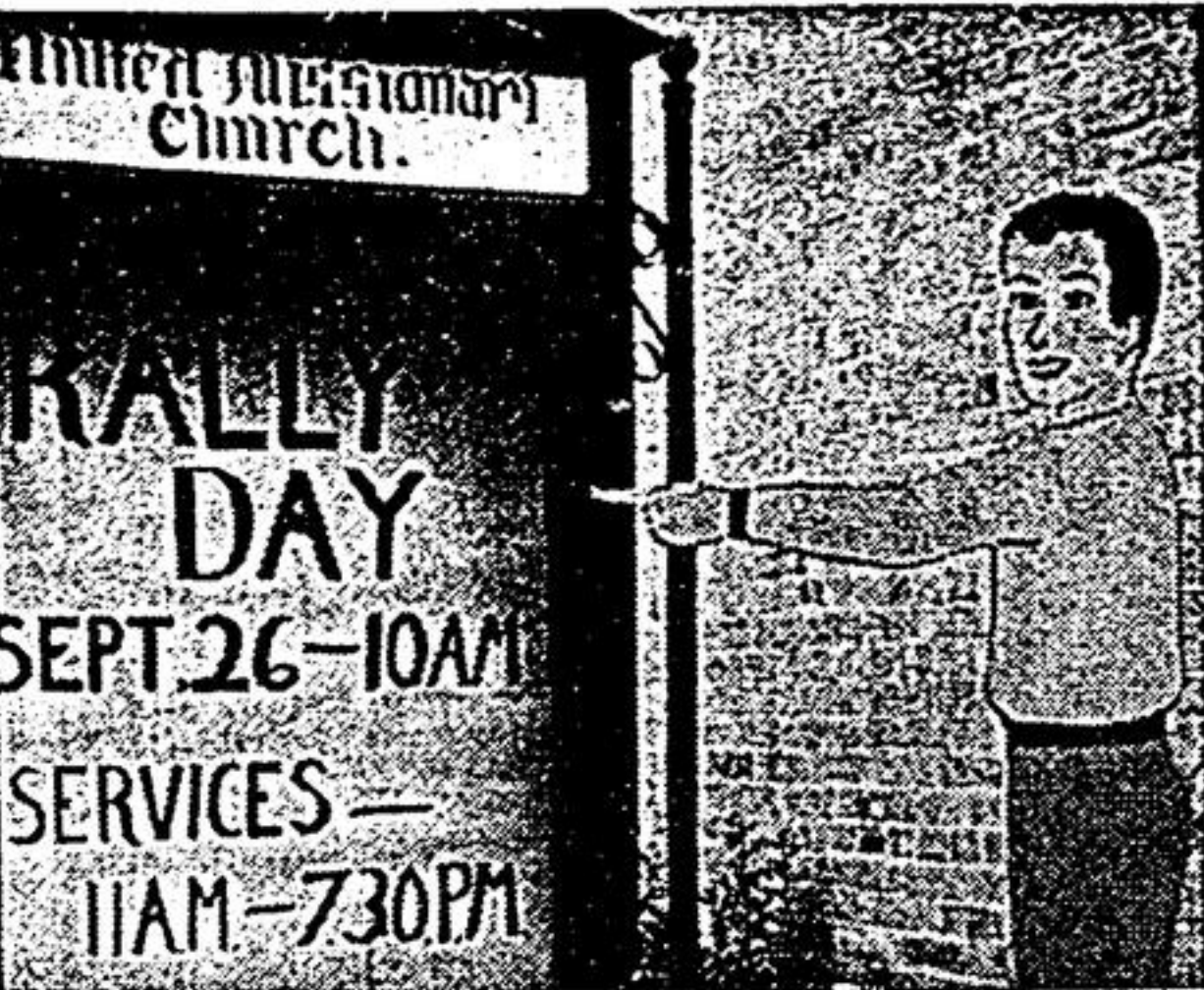

More Appointments To Health Unit Staff

The staff of the health unit is gradually being built up to accommodate the increased load of the additional three townships added to the health unit area in April, 1954. Two public health nurses and a clerk-stenographer have been added to the staff of the health unit during the last few weeks.

Mrs. Laura Shepherd, a graduate of the Saskatoon City Hospital School of Nursing, recently joined the health unit staff as a district public health nurse in the northern portion of Markham Township. Mrs. Shepherd took her post-graduate training in public health at the University of Toronto, and has been on the staff of the Department of Health in the city of Peterboro for several years. Her husband has recently been appointed to the teaching staff of the new Markham District High School.

Mrs. Ethel Bonter will join the staff of the York County Health Unit as a public health nurse in October, and comes to this organization from the Simcoe County Health Unit in Orillia. Mrs. Bonter, who has had considerable experience in public health nursing, took her nursing training with the Fordham Hospital in New York City and her post-graduate training in public health at the University of Western Ontario in London. She has served with the Victorian Order of Nurses in Cochrane for four years, and has been in public health work in Kirkland Lake, Toronto Township and Simcoe County. Mrs. Bonter will be working in the Newmarket area presently being covered by Miss Dorothy Trann who will be taking over part of the Township of King.

Mrs. B. L. Sinclair has joined the office staff of the York County Health Unit in the Newmarket headquarters on Sept. 14, 1954.

The school immunization program will go into operation in King, East Gwillimbury and Whitby townships starting in October. Immunization will be offered to the children whose parents sign a request for immunization with Diphtheria, tetoxid, Tetanus toxoid and Smallpox vaccination. At the present time, district public health nurses are compiling information regarding past immunization for each individual child concerned. Initial immunization or booster doses will be available as they may apply in each case. Parents are urged to appreciate that reliable immunization requires periodic booster doses in order to protect the child concerned, as well as the community as a whole.

Plans for infant and preschool immunization at child health conferences are also being prepared, and it is expected that immunization will be available for infants and preschool children at all of the child health conferences operated by the health unit beginning in October. Child health conferences are located in Sutton, Keswick, Newmarket, Aurora, Maple, Richmond Hill, Woodbridge, Stouffville, and Markham. Infants and preschool children in more remote areas will be offered immunization during the school immunization program in their school areas.

Damage In Thursday Morning Thunder Storm

Ontario farmers Thursday feared that crop damage caused by hail and rain in the morning's electrical storm would run into thousands of dollars.

One of the hardest hit areas was Markham Township, left without electric power from 4.10 a.m. until 8 a.m.

Farmers in Markham and the north end of Pickering Township, which was pelted by hail, feared heavy damage to tomato crops and damage to a lesser extent to corn.

In Markham Township itself, tomato, corn and cabbage crops were badly damaged.

At the same time, an estimated four to five million lbs. of blue-cured tobacco was reported lost in western Ontario as the result of frost which struck early Sunday morning.

Crop damage to tobacco is now estimated at over \$2,000,000.
