## Stole for Fun, Two Fined and Ordered To Pay for Fun

Crown Attorney Alex. C. Hall, Q.C., has suggested that two Pickering Township residents stole chickens under the same motives as four New York youths who killed for fun. Mr. Hall made the suggestion after Ernest Martin, 17, told the Whitty Police Court that he and Dale Lidster had stolen chickens from a Pickering farmer for fun.

Martin and Lidster, 20, appeared before Magistrate F. S. Ebbs charged with the theft of 14 chickens from the farm of R. B. Steeth. Constable Roy Morden, of the Pickering Twp. Police Department, told the Court that on the night of September 2nd he had been on his way to investigate a complaint of chicken theft when he encountered a car on the First Concession of Pickering Township. Upon inspection of the car, he said he found two chickens, one dead, and the two accused. In a nearby ditch he said, were two more dead chickens. He added that his investigation of the event indicated that two others, at least, were involved.

Crown Attorney Hall and Magistrate Ebbs both asked accused why they should steal chickens. Martin replied that they had done it "for fun". This led Mr. Hall to suggest that a like motive had fired four youths in New York to torture and kill one of their victims. Martin also expressed doubt that the owner of the chickens had lost 14 birds.

"The chicken-house was full of chickens," said Martin, "how would he know how many were missing if he didn't count them every night?"

"That is about the stupidest question I have ever heard," replied His Worship.

Each was fined \$25, and costs. Included in the costs were the cost of the 14 missing chickens, \$42.
