Altona Union Church celebrated its 74th Anniversary on Sunday, Sept. 19. It began with Rally Day at Sunday School, when a record attendance of over two hundred were pres-

ent. Rev. A. Lehman of the Muncey Indian Reserve, Brantford, speaker for the day, spoke briefly in the morning on his work among the Indians. The highlights of his remarks were emphasized by the presence of a little Indian girl whom he had brought with him. The Lehman family quartette, consisting of Mrs. Lehman, their two daughters and a son, provided music and Lawrence Lehman also sang a solo.

Rev. F. Huson of the United Missionary Church conducted the evening service, which was very well attended. The Youth for Christ Boys' Band played and the Lehman family quartette sang several numbers. Rev. A. Lehman in his message challenged young people to "Go Forth." The contributions of Rev. Mr. Lehman and his family and the Boys' Band were an inspiration, and were much appreciated by all who were able to attend.

### Mennonites Donate \$155,000 in Overseas Relief

The Korean war may be over but the starvation and suffering is not. Realizing this, Canadian Mennonites have donated \$155,000 worth of food, clothing, shoes, bedding and hospital supplies in the past year.

Some of this also went to Arab refugees in Jordan, and to those in need—mostly old folks and children—in central Europe, including Austria, and Greece.

About 6,000 Christmas bundles containing toys, clothing, soap and towels were sent to the children of these countries. The 1954 shipment is on its way.

Given Through Group The Mennonites are donating all this through their relief organization, the Mennonite Central Committee, which has its headquarters in Waterloo and warehouse in Kitchener.

E. G. Snyder of Hespeler is director with Harvey Towes of Winnipeg as associate director. The main office of the MCC is in Akron, Pa.

The MCC maintains staffs in the various countries served. About 18 Canadians are in various parts of the world. One of the last to leave was Woodrow Ramseyer of Baden who went to Korea.

Among the relief items sent, clothing is one of the most important. Some of it is new, some of it is used but all of it is in good shape, having been checked and repaired by Mennonite women from the Kitchener district.

Alice Snyder looks after this department which includes a cutting room where material is cut and, then sent out to the local churches to be sewn. Christmas bundles also come under Miss Snyder's department. These bundles contain one toy, one bar of soap, one towel and washcloth and several new items of clothing.

The value of one of these bundles is from \$5 to \$8. They go to children who are found to be in need and are not distributed at random.

Usually they are given out at gatherings held once a year in the various districts. Each bundle has a label attached which gives the name of the donor, as these bundles are shipped by MCC but are put together by individual women.

Many Letters Received Many letters are received each year by these women thanking them for their kindness.

Over \$30,000 worth of canned beef was also sent last year. The cattle, whether donated outright or bought with funds donated by individual Mennonite churches, are slaughtered under government inspection at the J. M. Schneider plant in Kitchener and canned by S. S. Martin and Sons of Florida.

The MCC has also done some work in the South American countries of Paraguay and Uruguay. Although Paraguay has the needed natural resources the influx of settlers has been so great that they have been unable to care for them.

Here MCC has stepped in, giving considerable assistance by sending road building machinery, building hospitals and schools and an experimental farm. Help in industrial development has also been given.

Lend Helping Hand Extreme drought conditions in large areas of Mexico during the last few years has worked hardships on many people there. Here again MCC has lent a helping hand. Wheat, flour and seed grains have been sent in considerable quantities.

After the truce in Indo-China MCC immediately started negotiations for entry into the free zone to help refugees fleeing the Communists. Executive secretary O. O. Miller has just returned from setting up a relief and rehabilitation program there.

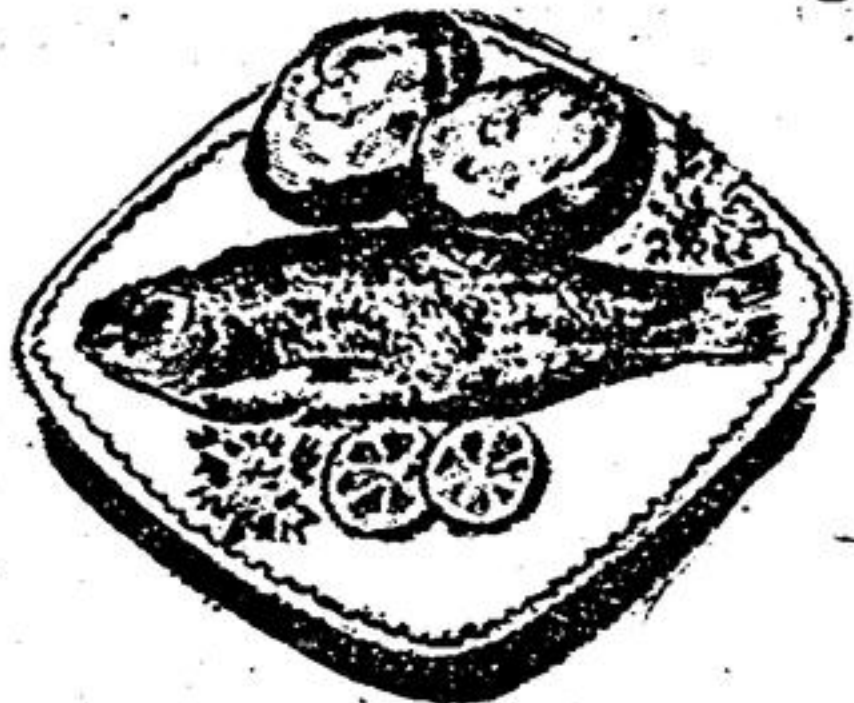

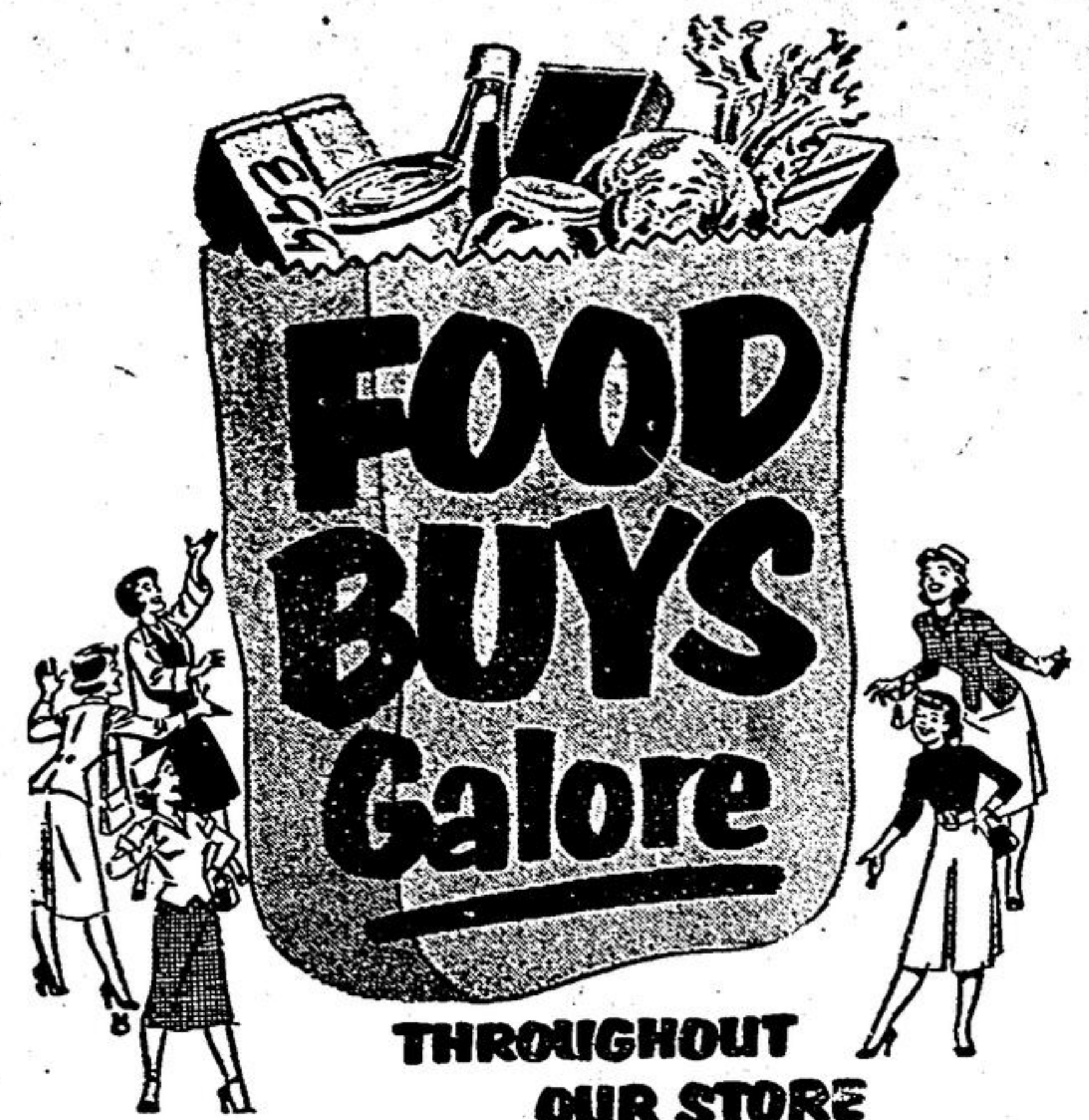

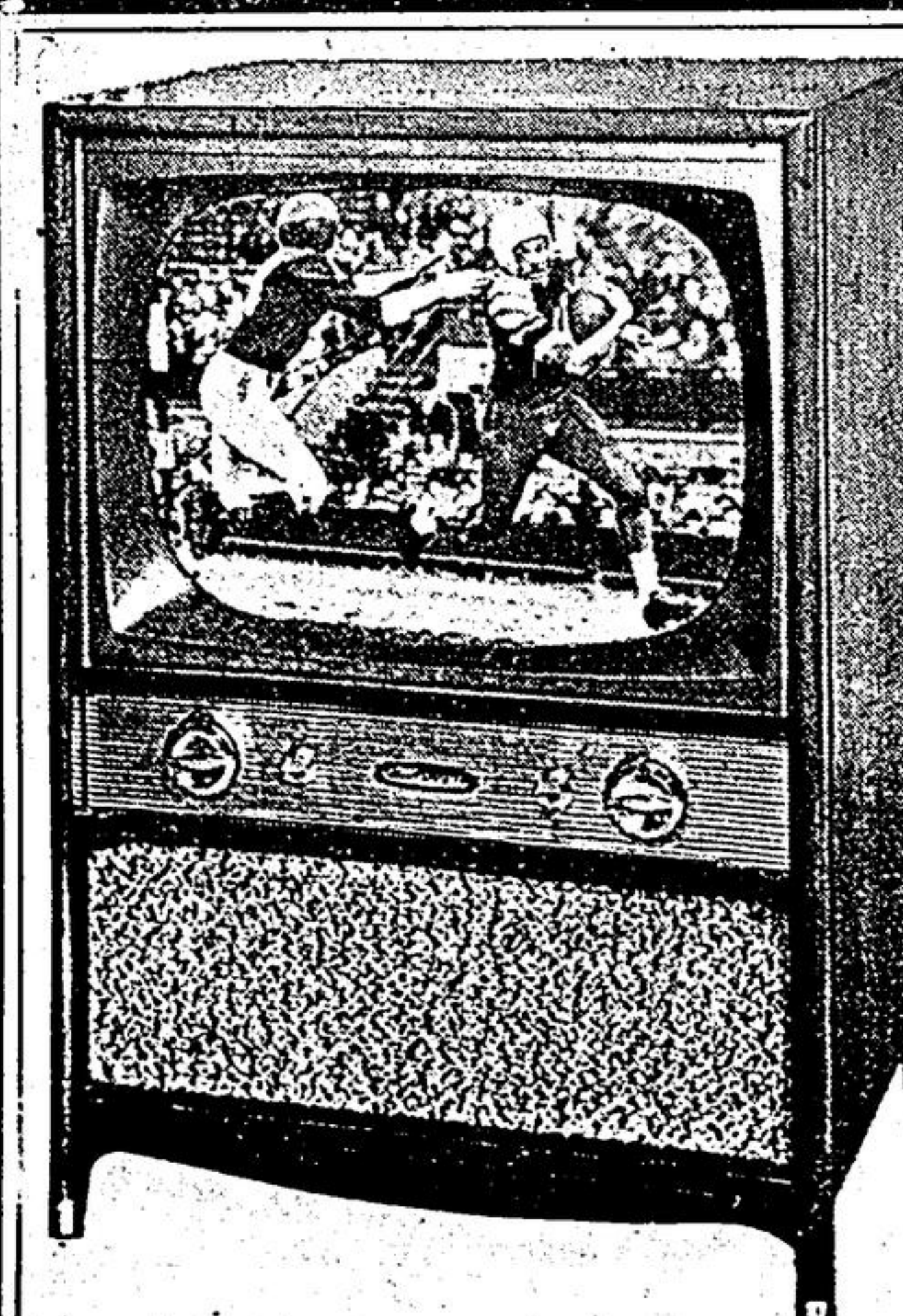
