Dunbarton United Church Marks 100th Anniversary

On Sunday, Oct. 3rd, Dunbarton United Church celebrated its 100th anniversary. A large crowd attended both morning and evening services.

On October 3rd, 1854, Reverend Alexander Kennedy was inducted into the pastoral charge faithfully serving his congregation until 1882. On October 3rd, 1954, the Very Reverend Alexander A. Scott, DD, Past Moderator of the United Church of Canada, his term of office just ended, is the guest minister.

Rev. Dr. Robert Thornton sailed from Scotland for Upper Canada on May 8, 1833. There was at that time no Presbyterian minister between Port Hope and Toronto. Dr. Thornton wended his way through forest paths and from clearing to clearing. Whitby, Columbus, Brooklin, Claremont, Brougham, Pickering and Dunbarton are all much indebted to his organizing powers. While the pioneers held family worship in their homes they were not content until they built a House of God.

The church was built and the congregation joyfully gathered in it for worship. When the need for expansion was felt, subscriptions of \$2.00 to \$500.00 were pledged at the first meeting, and a new church was built. Rev. A. F. Bamford has been the pastor since 1950.

Truck, Car, Bus In Double Collision

A pick-up truck, a small English car and a Gray Coach Lines bus were in a triple collision last week at Ajax.

The truck, driven by John McCarthy of R.R. 1, Pickering, slowed for a left hand turn to go north, when the small car rammed him from the rear. The driver was M. Rensink of Oshawa.

Only a few minutes later a Gray Coach Line bus, driven by Frank L. Bray of Toronto, crashed into the car driving it into the guard posts on the south side. It is a total wreck.

No one was injured, the bus carried but a few passengers. The other vehicles were unoccupied when the second crash happened.

High School Night Classes Popular

Pickering District High School will open its doors on October 12 for the regular session of Night Classes for Adults.

In the past these classes have proved to be very successful. Large groups are expected in the Beginners Sewing and Advanced Sewing classes. These two groups are carried on one night per week throughout the Fall and Winter.

The Shop Class provides an opportunity for both men and women to learn how to use power and hand tools and to make useful articles. Two groups are formed, meeting one night per week.

Four Plead Guilty Uxbridge Break-In

Four men, including one who has just completed a nine-year term in Kingston meted out by Magistrate Ebbs, have been remanded in custody for one week to be sentenced for breaking and entering an Uxbridge grocery store. The four are James Maher, 20, of 209 Cannon Street, Hamilton; William Garbutt, 34, of Guild Street, Pickering; William Delorme, 34, of 2272 Jarvis Street, Toronto; and Joseph Garbutt, 27, also of Guild Street, Pickering. William Garbutt told the Court that he had been sentenced nine years ago by Magistrate F. S. Ebbs in Oshawa on charges arising out of the shooting of an Oshawa grocery store clerk. He said that he was at that time sentenced to 10 years but had been released this year after time being allowed for good behaviour.

The four were hailed into the Whitby Police Court by Constable C. G. Wilson, of the Uxbridge Detachment of the OPP. All four pleaded guilty to the charge of breaking, entering and theft of Hickling Brothers Grocery Store in Uxbridge. Constable Wilton told the Court that on the morning of September 20th he had inspected the store and found that a night latch on the front door had been pried open with a pinch-bar or some such tool. Inside, he said, it was found that a quantity of cigarettes, about \$50 worth of groceries and \$57 in cash were missing. At 11 p.m. that night, he said, Toronto City Police advised him that the four accused had been arrested and had all given statements, which were read in Court.

After the elder Garbutt had advised Court that he had just been released from penitentiary this year and Delorme, Maher's uncle, admitted they had a record which was "pretty bad", His Worship remanded all four in custody for RCMP files on their histories.
