



SATURDAY NIGHT WILL BE HOCKEY NIGHT IN STOUFFVILLE
 Saturday night will be hockey night in Stouffville. Every Saturday night the Stouffville Clippers will provide hockey entertainment in the local arena. They will open here against Lyndhurst Motors on October 13rd. There will be public skating on Wednesday nights throughout the winter.
 Last season the Sr. schedule had Stouffville playing both on Saturday night and Wednesday night thus breaking into the regular public skating routine. This year however definite nights have been set aside.

BETTER MUSIC NEEDED
 There is a serious need for better music at the Stouffville Arena during Public Skating nights. Some of the records sound as if they came out of Noah's Ark and the sound system is far from adequate, in fact skaters at the east end of the arena can hear nothing more than a muffled hum. Arena Manager W. T. Rennie says that new records have been ordered and should be available very soon. They certainly can't come too soon.

 For many years literally dozens of Stouffville residents journey into the north woods on hunting expeditions during the fall season of the year and I have always wondered what magnetic impulse prompted these local sportsmen to make this annual excursion. Is it the love of hunting? Is it the longing for peace and quiet that prevails in the back woods? Is it the magnificent color of red, orange and gold in the thousands of maple trees? Perhaps many like to hunt and many like to rest but I am sure that the eye-appealing scenery probably holds the biggest thrill of all. Over the Thanksgiving weekend I motored to Minden. It was the first time I had ever been in the Haliburton district in the Fall. One cannot describe in words the beautiful scenery. MINOR HOCKEY OUTLOOK NOT BRIGHT
 The hockey outlook for boys over thirteen years of age in Stouffville does not appear too bright, at the present time at least. Every day for the past two weeks the young lads in town have been enquiring about plans for the organization of midget, bantam and juvenile teams here but they all must face the same answer. "We haven't heard anything definite yet."
 The only age group that is assured of hockey for the next six or seven months is the Lions PeeWees who commence their league activity on Saturday.

Some believe that the Stouffville Lions Club should operate the entire minor hockey setup here which includes pee-wee, midget, bantam and juvenile. It has been pointed out that this is the case in some other towns. Such an all-out hockey promotion by the local service club would be fine, but it must be remembered that there are many other worthy channels where financial assistance must be directed besides hockey. Every season the Stouffville Lions spend hundreds of dollars in the operation of the "Little Lads League" and many members believe that the club cannot afford to spend any more money on hockey. I agree that it is too bad to bring the young boys along in hockey until they are thirteen years old then drop them just at an age when they should be receiving the proper coaching and practice but I also feel that the financial burden is too much for one service club to handle. A short time ago Mr. Tom Wedsetoft attempted to organize a replacement for the defunct Athletic Club but some where along the line his plane bogged down with the result the idea was dropped. That is where Stouffville's Sports Program hit a dead end road. Had this organization become a reality there would be financial assistance for the remaining hockey clubs as well as softball, hardball and other types of sport.
 What's the solution? I wish I knew. The only answer is to attempt to re-organize the Athletic Association but even that is too late for this winter. Perhaps the parents of the boys interested in playing either Midget, Bantam or Juvenile might be able to solve the problem for this season at least.

O'Neill, Rumney In Pitchers' Duel, Markham Wins

The second game in the Markham Twp. League softball finals played at Markham on Thursday night developed into a fine pitchers' duel between Peg O'Neill of the Aces and Jack Rumney of Markham. Markham took the second game 4-1. Three of the winners' four runs were unearned.
 Errors ruined Buttonville's chances of evening the series. Jack Rumney on the mound for the Sluggers hurled fine ball throughout the nine innings. He allowed six hits, walked two and struck out nine batters. O'Neill on the mound for Markham chalked up ten strike outs, gave up six hits and walked one.
 Buttonville made their first error of the game in the second inning when right fielder Don McIntosh bobbled Charlie Parent's fly ball. No damage resulted, however, as Harry Young and Monte Holman were strike out victims and Jerry Meharg popped out to Jack Watson.
 In the sixth inning Lloyd Raymer, Markham's hard-hitting second baseman, lifted a high fly ball into left field that Mac Clement misjudged and the runner took second. He proceeded to steal third and romped home with the first run of the game when Morley Petch doubled.
 The Aces sewed up the game in the eighth with an additional three runs. Lloyd Raymer smashed a well-hit ball over the head of Mac Clement and circled the sacks for the Aces second run. Bob Petch went down on strikes but brother Morley connected for his second extra base clout. In attempting to pick the runner off moving to third the ball slipped past Jack Watson and Petch came on to score. Pinch-hitter "Red" Fleming was thrown out second to first but Harry Young was safe when Ronnie Bell dropped the ball at first base. Monte Holman singled to drive Young in with the Aces final run of the game.
 Buttonville threatened to break into the scoring in the sixth and eighth innings when they pushed runners around to third base but their clutch batsmen failed to come through with the necessary hits when needed. In the sixth inning, Don McIntosh beat out a good bunt and Bud Watson sacrificed him to second. Ronnie Bell singled moving the front to third but Mac Clement popped out to Morley Petch. Bert Baker, Buttonville's Yogi Berra was given an intentional pass to load the sacks but Jack Rumney popped to catcher Bob Petch to put out the fire.
 In the eighth inning McIntosh again led off for Buttonville with a bunt single and moved to third when Ronnie Bell grounded out M. Petch to Meharg. McIntosh died at third when Clement grounded out to third to first.

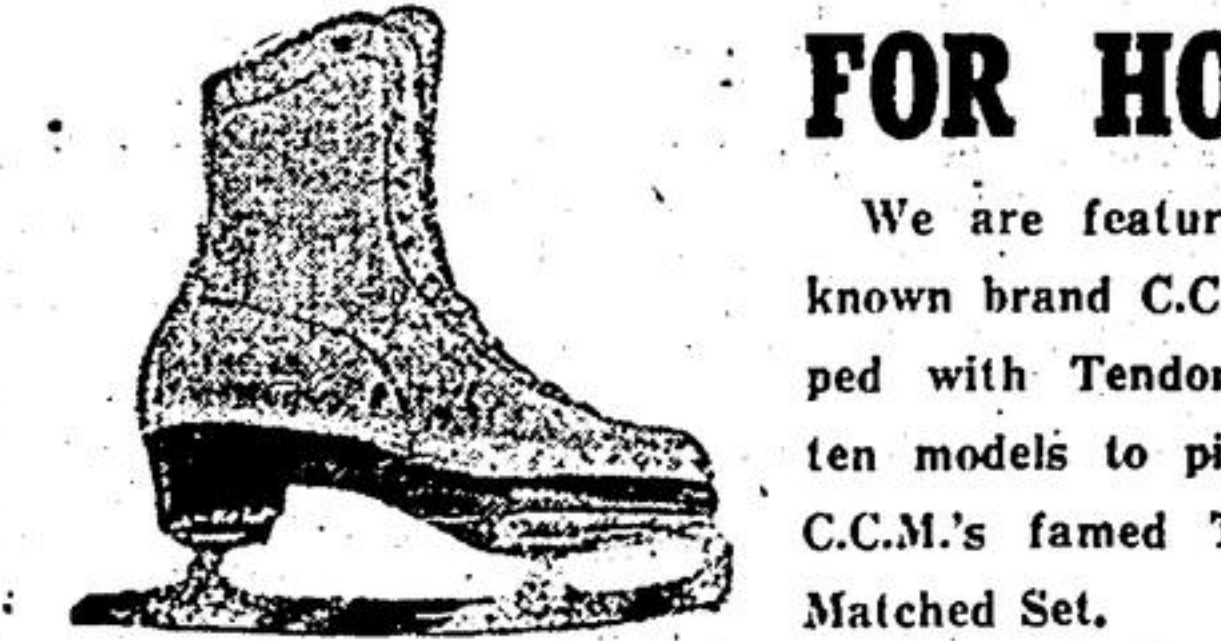
