Provincial Judging

In a competition of 57 teams representing the best in junior livestock judges from all counties in Ontario, York teams stood 2nd, 3rd and 10th. The competition was held on Friday, Oct. 22nd, at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. Andrew Watson and Gerald Livingston representing the Woodbridge 4-H Calf Club with a score of 886 were only three points behind the championship team, The Schomberg 4-H Calf Club team, standing third in the competition and consisting of John Sheardown and Grant Leonard were but one point lower with a score of 885. In tenth position was the Sutton team with a score of 871. The Sutton team was Richard Munro and Robert Pegg. The teams were coached by W. M. Cockburn, Agricultural Representative for York County and his Associate, E. K. Pearson.
