Has Spent Near Half of Lifetime Behind Bars

A 38-year-old Brantford shoemaker, who has already served 15 years in penitentiary, was yesterday sentenced to two more years by His Honour, Judge J. E. Pritchard, in the Ontario County Court. Nicholas Marchuk, under a two-year sentence imposed by Magistrate F. S. Ebbs, pleaded guilty to a break-in and entry charge, car theft and escaping custody, all offences committed more than two years ago. He was sentenced to two years on each charge, all to run concurrently. He will serve this two-year sentence handed down in Uxbridge in 1952 by Magistrate Ebbs on a car theft charge. This sentence was never served because Marchuk escaped from the Ontario County gaol on the next day.

At the time of his escape, October 3rd, 1952, Marchuk was remanded to this jail to await trial on a charge of breaking and entering the Uxbridge Creamery on Sept. 12th of that year. Yesterday in Whitby, he pleaded guilty to the charge. Constable Swinson, of Uxbridge, told the Court that on that night he had approached the creamery on patrol and heard a hammering noise. He called Constable Wilton, of the Uxbridge Detachment of the OPP, and later that night the car which Constable Swinson had seen parked outside the creamery was found in a ditch about four miles south of the town. Marchuk was approached later on foot near Stouffville.

Jail Governor James Sutherland, on the escaping custody charge, told the Court that about 3 a.m. October 3rd, 1952, he had been awakened at the jail. A search was made of the second floor, he said, and later outside. While searching outside, a car sped away from the county-owned garage.

An inspection of the cell which Marchuk had occupied and had absented himself from, said Mr. Sutherland, showed an eight-inch by 14-inch hole in the brick ceiling. In the attic above, he said, a board had been ripped off the roof and a rope of torn blankets led from the roof to the ground. Allan Lavis, courthouse caretaker, told the Court that his car had disappeared that night and was found in York County later, with a dead battery and ignition wires crossed.

George J. Boychyn, acting Crown Attorney, read Marchuk's record, which began in 1927 in juvenile court. Since then, Marchuk had acquired something of a record by having 27 convictions against his name. He has been in penitentiary five times since then and served 15 years. Following his escape from here 2 years ago, he was apprehended in Detroit only this year and returned to Whitby for trial following extradition proceedings.

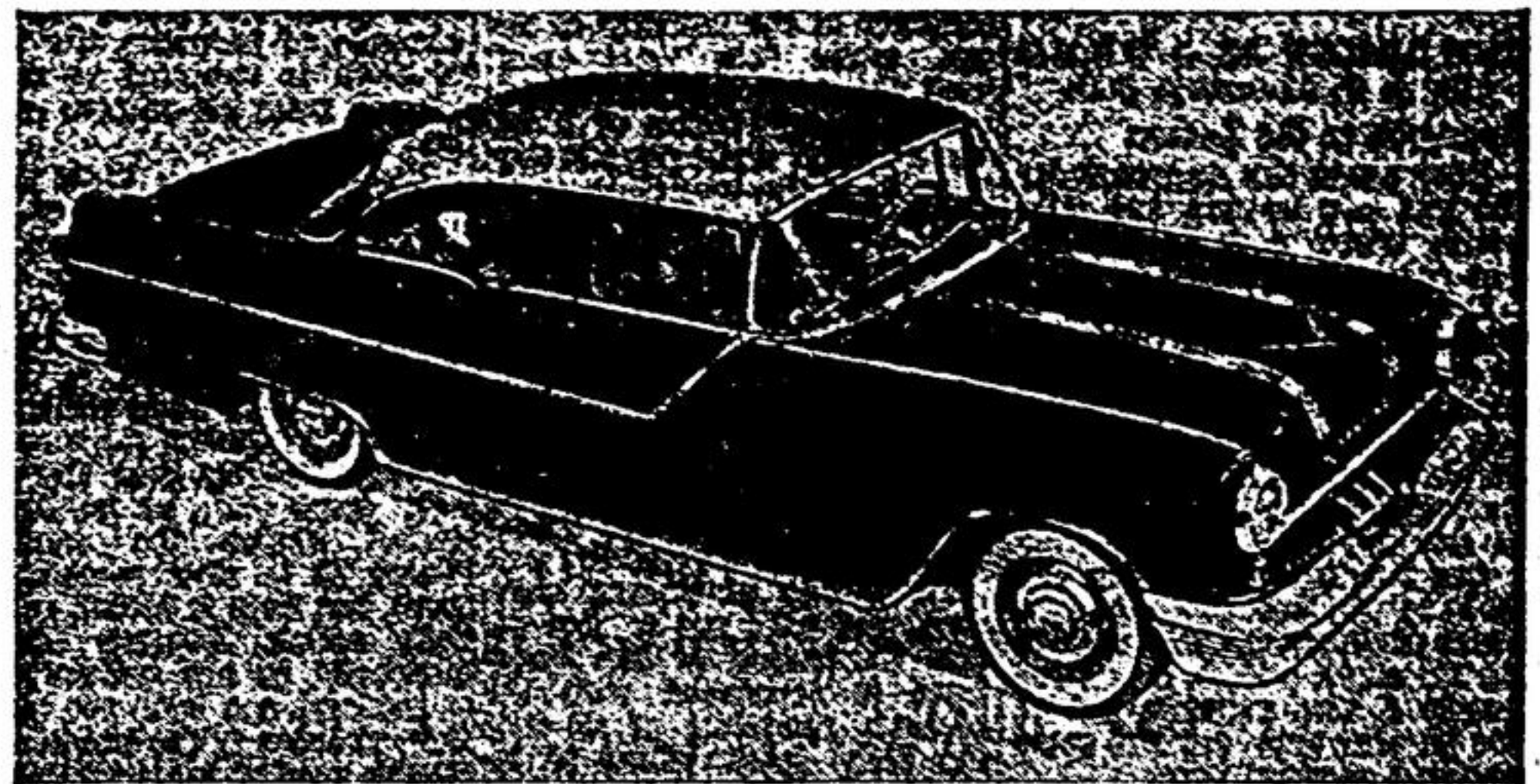
