Toronto Growth Is Greatest On Continent

Mr. Fred Gardiner, Chairman of the Metropolitan Council, told a York County audience on Monday night that only two other cities on this continent are growing at al rate comparable with Toronto. They are Dallas, Texas, and Los Angeles, California. Metropolitan Toronto's growth will be felt for a radius of one hundred miles. Four arterial highways are planned to service this huge growth. The expressway from the Humber to the Woodbine, the Don Valley Parkway, the Spadina extension and the Eglinton crosstown route. These will cost \$100,000,000. They must be built to service industrial development, or it will go elsewhere. We must have industry to help finance the services necessary for our huge population. Said Mr. Gardiner, "Our pro-
