Ballantrae Rumpus Brings Shots, Arrests

A Saturday night brawl punctuated by shotgun blasts and rock tossing on the heels of a wild drinking party, erupted near Ballantrae as the result of a "love triangle," Vandorf O.P.P. reported this week.

Charged with willful malicious damage, but released on bail, is Stanley Hall, about 50, who, police said, made the attack on the home of a neighbor, John Trowbridge. Trowbridge is in Don Jail in Toronto, charged with illegal consumption of liquor.

Provincial Police said the men had been drinking at Trowbridge's home with Hall's wife, Gertrude, when Hall accused Trowbridge of "carrying on" with his wife. An argument followed and Hall returned to his own home.

Minutes later all the ground-floor windows of the Trowbridge home were broken by rocks and both doors to the house blown open by shotgun blasts from a 10.20 gauge shotgun.

Police said the ceiling of a bedroom in the house was peppered with shotgun pellets.

Neighbors called police who arrested Hall and Trowbridge.

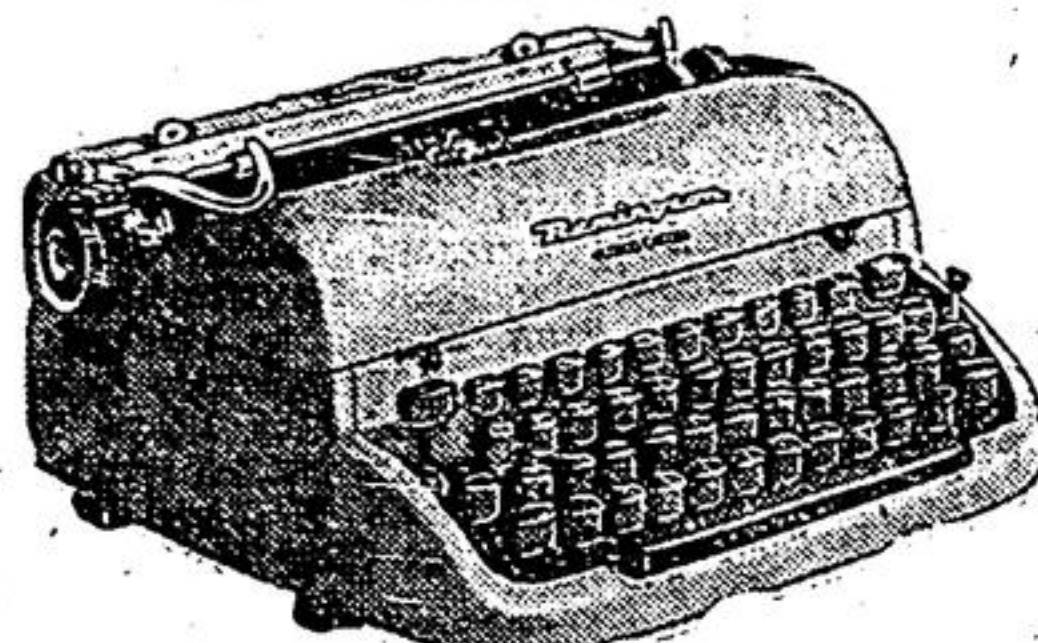
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MT. PISGAH

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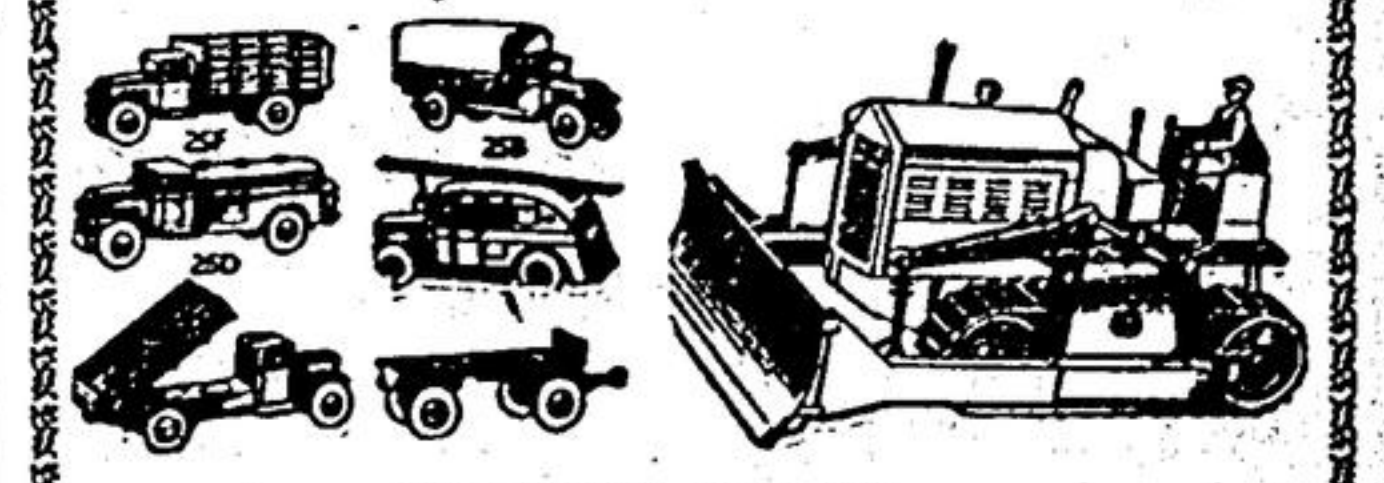
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
