**Redmen Even Series With 5-3 Win Over Clippers**

Stouffville Clippers suffered their second defeat of the season as they dropped a 5-3 verdict to Newmarket here on Saturday night. It was Herbie Cain's big line of Sinclair, Boniface and Brankston that spelled defeat for the homesters. Sinclair notched three goals. Boniface and Prastnik fired singles.

The visitors broke into a 1-0 lead at 7:40 of the first period when Sinclair tipped the puck past Rhodes. Play in the opening twenty minutes was of the ragged variety.

Both teams set a fast pace in the second and third periods. Don Claydon put Stouffville back on even terms when he stepped out of the players box, grabbed a loose puck at the blue-line and drilled a low shot into the bottom corner of the Newmarket cage.

The Clippers went one up at 3:52 of the period when Joe Lewis snared Gordie Haddleton's pass and dribbled a shot past Cruikshank. The period was far from over, however, as the Redmen raced back and counted two in a row. Prastnik scored from Chard at 10:11 and Sinclair put the Canaltown crew in the lead to stay with an unassisted tally.

Gordie Boniface teamed up with linemates Sinclair and Boniface to give Newmarket a 4-2 advantage at 7:58 of the final frame. Macintosh put the Clippers back in the contest momentarily at 13:18 but Sinclair sewed the game up with five minutes to play.

The entire contest was one of the best played here this season. Both clubs were going at top speed and goaltenders Cruikshank and Rhodes were called on to make a number of sensational saves. Rhodes in particular was great especially in the second and third periods when the Redmen forced the play to his doorstep.

The teams played it rough throughout the sixty minutes but there was only one real out-break of fisticuffs. Fiery Gordie Haddleton and Gord Boniface squared off behind the Stouffville net in the second period. Haddleton took the round with three rights and a left to his opponent's head. Both players were banished with majors.

**Haddleton Sparks Clippers to 8-4 Win Over Newmarket**

A three-goal outburst by pint-sized Gordie Haddleton sparked the Stouffville Clippers to an 8-4 win over the Newmarket Redmen on Friday night. The fast-stepping centre-man fired all of his goals in the first period as the winners piled up a convincing 4-0 lead. Frank Stephenson counted two more in the second frame without replay from the big guns of the Canaltown crew.

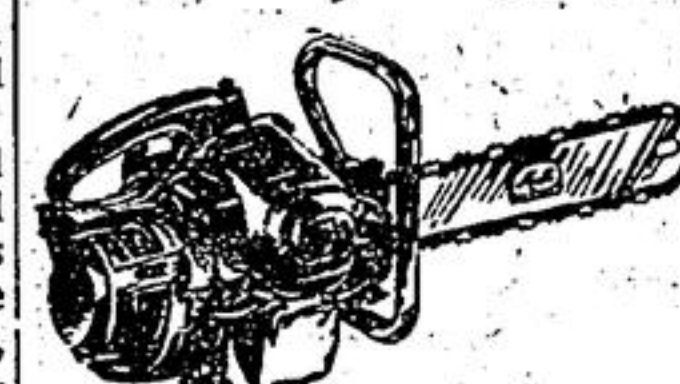
**Coach Watson Tossed Out of Hockey Opener**
