## Ontario Potatoes Tops At Royal Winter Fair

Ontario grown potatoes out-ranked all others at this year's Royal Winter Fair, winning the top awards in both Seed and Table Stock classes, as well as a good number of lesser prizes.

The Championship in the Table Stock class went to Comme Trotteur of R.R. 1, Chelmsford in the Sudbury District who won the Snyder's Potato Chip Special. In this class which had one hundred thirteen entries, sixty-five out of a possible eighty prizes went to Ontario growers.

In the Cooking Potato class, which was judged on the basis of 50% for dry matter or starch content and 50% for external appearance, Ontario growers won four of the six prizes from a total of seventeen entries. Arthur T. Hartwick's Green Mountain variety won top honors in this class. Martin Maurice of Penetang came 4th with Keswick; Jack Johnson of Uxbridge was fifth with Katahdin and Norman Marchand 6th with canoe variety.

The Canadian Horticultural Council's Diploma for the most outstanding Commercial exhibit went to the North Simcoe Seed Potato Grower's Co-operative. Other winners in the same class were: North Simcoe Crop Improvement Association, La Fontaine Seed Potato Restricted Area and Dufferin Potato Grower's Association.

In the Seed Potato classes with a total entry of one hundred thirty-four, thirty-six out of a possible ninety-six prizes were claimed by Ontario grow-

ers. They competed with exhibits from every province with the exception of Newfoundland, and two states.

David Hackett, of Cochrane won the International Championship with his Keswick variety, and the reserve went to Russell E. Hartwick of Walford Station who exhibited Katahdins.

Six of the possible 8 firsts and four seconds in Seed classes went to Ontario growers. In potato classes for 4-H Club members forty-three exhibits were shown. Club members from Ontario took thirty-three of the thirty-seven prizes in four classes.

Minimum Prices Suggested For Oats and Barley Seed

Following consideration by the Seed Marketing & Publicity Committee of the Ontario Soil & Crop Improvement Association, the following suggested minimum prices were recommended for 1955 seedling:

OATS — Commercial No. 1 grade, \$1.50 per bushel. Registered No. 1 grade, \$1.75 per bushel.

BARLEY — Commercial No. 1 grade, \$2.00 per bushel. Registered No. 1 grade, \$2.50 per bushel.

The above prices are based on retail sales of treated seed, including, at local shipping points. It is expected that due to demands based on merit some varieties will sell above these minimum prices.

Losses in seed grain by rust and rain have been heavy this year over a wide area of the province, particularly in Eastern and Northern Ontario, as well as in Western Canada and the United States. Supplies, therefore, are not too plentiful considering the large number of farmers who will require seed and growers would be well advised to arrange for their 1955 supply as soon as possible.

Only varieties suitable to particular localities should be seeded in order to secure best results. Accordingly, suitable quantities of recommended varieties should be saved in order to avoid the possibility of feed grain being used as seed, and the use of western feed grain as seed should be discouraged.

Each year it becomes more important to "buy by grade", giving special attention to germination. Considering prices, registered seed offers exceptionally good value.

The Seed Marketing & Publicity Committee consists of representative growers from across the province, together with crop officials of the Canada and Ontario Departments of Agriculture. W. E. Breckon of Burlington is Chairman and R. E. Goodin, Toronto, is Secretary.

## EDITOR'S MAIL

Binbrook, Ont. Nov. 19, 1964

Mr. Chas. Nolan Stouffville, Ont. Dear Sir:

I read your Editorial in the Stouffville Tribune of Nov. 11, "Back in Model 'T' days a 200-mile trip would be a long day and an exceedingly tiresome one."

I am not writing to contradict that statement or to suggest any corrections, but I thought you might be interested in an account of a trip I and a young man, Mack Mustard, took in a 1922 Model "T" Roadster (they were called then) in Aug. 1923.

We left Strathaven, about 15 miles South-east of Owen Sound on Monday morning, Aug. 20, going by St. Mary's, London, Windsor, Detroit, Toledo, Findlay, and Dayton to a place near Wilmington, Ohio. We left at 2:30 a.m. and drove all that day, all that night and until 6:30 a.m. Tuesday — 28 hours. One tire went flat six times — four times reasonably near a filling station but twice about two miles away. I had bought two new tires before leaving and one of them had a rough spot inside that blistered and blew out the tube. After I arrived, I discovered the trouble, so I used one of the tubes for an interliner and we came home without any trouble.

The Highways were not marked then so clearly as now. I tried to follow a road map, but the map was not correct or I misunderstood it. Anyway, we frequently went the wrong way. I had installed a speedometer on the car (1922 Fords were not equipped with them) and it registered 583 miles. I checked the speedometer down there with my brother's Dodge and it registered the same as his, both for speed and mileage. I drove the entire distance except 53 miles driven by my friend Mack.

The last time I went down in 17 hours by bus from King City.
