**Clips Off Color, Lose To Newmarket, 4 to 2**

Stouffville Clippers came up with one of their worst hockey displays of the season on Tuesday night and bowed to Newmarket Redmen 4-2. The home-owners couldn't seem to do anything right and the visitors took advantage of their mistakes to rack up a 3-0 lead at the end of the second period. Stouffville showed signs of a rally in the third session but could not pull the contest out of the fire. The score could easily have been doubled but for the fine work of goaltender Jack Rhodes in the Clipper cage.

Russ Brankston swooped in for two fast goals late in the opening period. Kenny Sinclair added another unassisted tally in the second frame to lengthen Newmarket's lead.

Ronnie Bell broke the ice for Stouffville at 4:28 of the 3rd period on passes from Ken McNeil and Don Claydon. When it appeared likely that the Clippers might close the gap, defenceman Ken Broughton fired a lone shot from the blueline that caught the corner of the Clipper cage. Hal Gibson notched his third goal in two games from Nick Dubick at 12:23 to complete the scoring in the game.

The Stouffville defence appeared to be unusually weak and on several occasions Newmarket forwards broke in alone on goaltender Jack Rhodes. Rearguard Joe Scatolon did not dress for the game and was badly missed. Ronnie Bell and Ed Calhoun looked best for Stouffville.

**McDowell Paces Jets to 5-2 Win Over Red Wings**

Unionville Jets, led by centreman Bruce McDowell, scored a 5-2 win over Stouffville Red Wings in a Jr. D game played in the local arena on Thursday night. It marked the second win for Unionville over the home town squad.

The contest was a goaltenders' battle until the third period when the visitors got scored the locals four to one. Netminder Bruce Middleton of the Red Wings turned in a fine performance despite a couple of fluke-shots that slipped past him. Although Stouffville had their share of the play they didn't take advantage of their many scoring chances inside the Unionville blueline. The Jets' final goal was dumped into an empty net as Coach Polly Minton elected to pull Middleton from the nets and replace him with an extra forward. McDowell grabbed a loose puck in front of his own goal and lobbed it down the ice for Unionville's fifth tally.

The Jets opened the scoring at 5:25 of the first period when left winger John Darbyson blinked the light from Atkinson. Defenceman Ted Mendyk of the Red Wings put the teams back on even terms with an unassisted goal at 13:32 of the opening session.

There was no scoring in the second frame. Both clubs battled hard for the best period of hockey in the game. It was during the second twenty minutes that goalie Bruce Middleton excelled between the pipes for the Red Wings. The period featured some sensational end to end rushes and provided the fans with plenty of excitement. Harold Hodgson, released recently to Stouffville from Galt, had the best scoring chance of the period when he broke into the clear but he missed the net with a rising shot.

The final frame saw Unionville drive to a three-goal lead before the Red Wings could find the scoring range. Bruce McDowell broke the 1-1 deadlock at 1:32 of the period and Geo. Cary made it 3-1 for the Jets two minutes later. McDowell showed why he's the Jets' top marksman by bagging his second tally at 10:24 to give the sixth concession crew a 3-goal lead.

Dave Hammersley, Harold Hodgson and Jim Rennie combined for Stouffville's second and final goal. Rennie slapped the puck into the twine from a difficult angle.

In a desperate effort to get his team back in the game Coach Minton threw an extra forward into the fray but the move backfired and McDowell golfed the puck down the ice into the empty Red Wing net.

The game was clearly played with only three penalties being handed out. Stouffville defenceman Grant Wagg and Unionville forward John Darbyson served the only extra minutes in the cooler following a wrestling bee. They each received majors. Stunden received the only other penalty, that for tripping.

For Stouffville, Grant Wagg, Dave Hammersley and Bruce Middleton looked best while Bruce McDowell, Les Jarvis and John Darbyson were Unionville's top performers.
