To Continue York County Police Force

The future of the York County police force was decided at a final meeting of county council held in Newmarket, last week. On a recommendation of the special Administration of Justice committee, chaired by Reeve J. O. Dales, Newmarket, council decided to continue the county force of 16 members in its present capacity until Dec. 31, 1955.
The fate of the force has been under discussion for some time. Last year a temporary arrangement was made to continue the force during 1954 and since then the discontinuance of it has been considered seriously.
The full cost of maintaining the force will be met by the Attorney General's department of Ontario with the exception of the costs involved in policing the magistrate's court at Newmarket.
Before the Metropolitan area was established, the county paid the full cost of operating the force. When the county was split by Bill 80, the Attorney General's department asked that the county force be maintained to serve the courts of the Metro area municipalities as well as those of the continuing county.
In 1954 the province temporarily bore the major portion of the burden until some definite line of action could be adopted by the continuing county. It cost \$85,000 to maintain the force in 1954.
A pension plan for the present members of the force and for those who served prior to the division of the county is receiving further study by the county.
This will bring a uniformity of cost distribution to all the areas now served by the county force.
