




EVERY NIGHT in the week it's square dance time in Tucson, Ariz., with dozens of clubs putting out the country style music. They're members of Belles and Beaux club.

## FOR A SAFER LANDING

FOR THE FIRST TIME the general public has seen the method used overseas by the United States Air Force to stop crippled aircraft. For those of us who couldn't attend the showing at Wright-Patterson base in Dayton, O., here are some pictures of it. An F-86 is preparing to test a runway barrier. Maj. Raymond Hunt, piloting his craft at 100 miles an hour, then plows into the nylon netting. A net flips a cable up into the plane's landing gear. The jet drags 45,000 pounds of chain attached to the cable into a tangled heap — but the plane stops within about 500 feet. The system is roughly similar to the arresting gear used on Navy carriers.



Springy nylon netting is set up while Major Hunt climbs into his jet (background).




High-speed cameras and electronic equipment record test as plane rams into netting.


