NEWS FOR THE FARMER

Canada's New Poultry Testing Plant

Canada's new central testing station for poultry breeding stock is nearing completion. It is expected to be ready to receive the first birds entered in the new random test policy on April 1.

The new building marks another forward step in the Record of Performance for poultry that has been in operation for thirty-five years in the interest of improving poultry breeding in Canada.

Located on the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, the Station will serve poultry breeders in any part of the country. Its purpose is to provide breeders with a means of testing representative samples of their birds under uniform conditions of feeding, housing and care.

The Station, a one-storey building, contains 68 pens identical in size, 12'x16', arranged on either side of a central alley. The building is 425 feet long with a central block containing a feed room, and an egg storage room with controlled temperatures. Each of the 68 pens will accommodate 50 birds, and since each breeder's entry will consist of 100 birds this permits each entry to be housed in two pens, one on either side of the central alley to allow for any differences in temperature or other conditions due to the location of the pens.

Equipment in the pens is so arranged that droppings can be removed and eggs gathered from the central alley. Water is brought to the partitions between the pens so two pens can be supplied from the one outlet.

Ontario County Farm Forum

The Forums of Ont. County have met to discuss the subject, "Farm Forums in the Community". Nine forums reported on this topic and all agreed that in their community forums had helped to foster neighbourliness, helped to develop local leadership, as in a small group people speak up and learn to voice opinions that would be lost in a larger gathering.

Regarding the matter of the farmer's adjusting himself to the new trends in consumer buying, the majority were of the opinion that only the best produce should be sold, and efforts should be made to see that only the best is grown.

Farm Insurance was also discussed. Five out of nine forums put Fire Insurance as most important. Two forums thought Fire and Auto Insurance a good investment.

Another subject was a national Health Plan. To the question of medical, Hospital and Health services in our community six forums were divided in opinion. The Co-op Medical Plan, available in Ontario County, was considered a very good one. Blue Cross was mentioned. Some thought we could have more health inspection at the schools; some have a nurse service, but not all. The Well Baby Clinic at Uxbridge, and T.B. Clinic were good ideas.

To the question of where young farmers in this area should look for credit, there was a variety of answers. Parents, Jr. Farmers Loan, Farm Loan Board, V.L.A. and private loans. As to the question of avoiding undue expense, it was thought that the farmer should try to rent land. If buying, try to get a medium-priced farm, and not go in too deep. Buy good used machinery and make sure to have stock of good quality.

Several Forums have helped to organize for Warble Fly control and helped sponsor Jr. Calf Clubs. In one township the Forums have helped to organize a Township unit of the Federation of Agriculture and have also helped on a hospital auxiliary.

"The Farmer's Share" was another subject and nine forums reported that the buying habits have changed over the last ten years by the buying of more canned foods, frozen foods and ready-mixes. The practice of credit-buying and barter has disappeared in nearly all areas; buying is now mostly cash and carry.

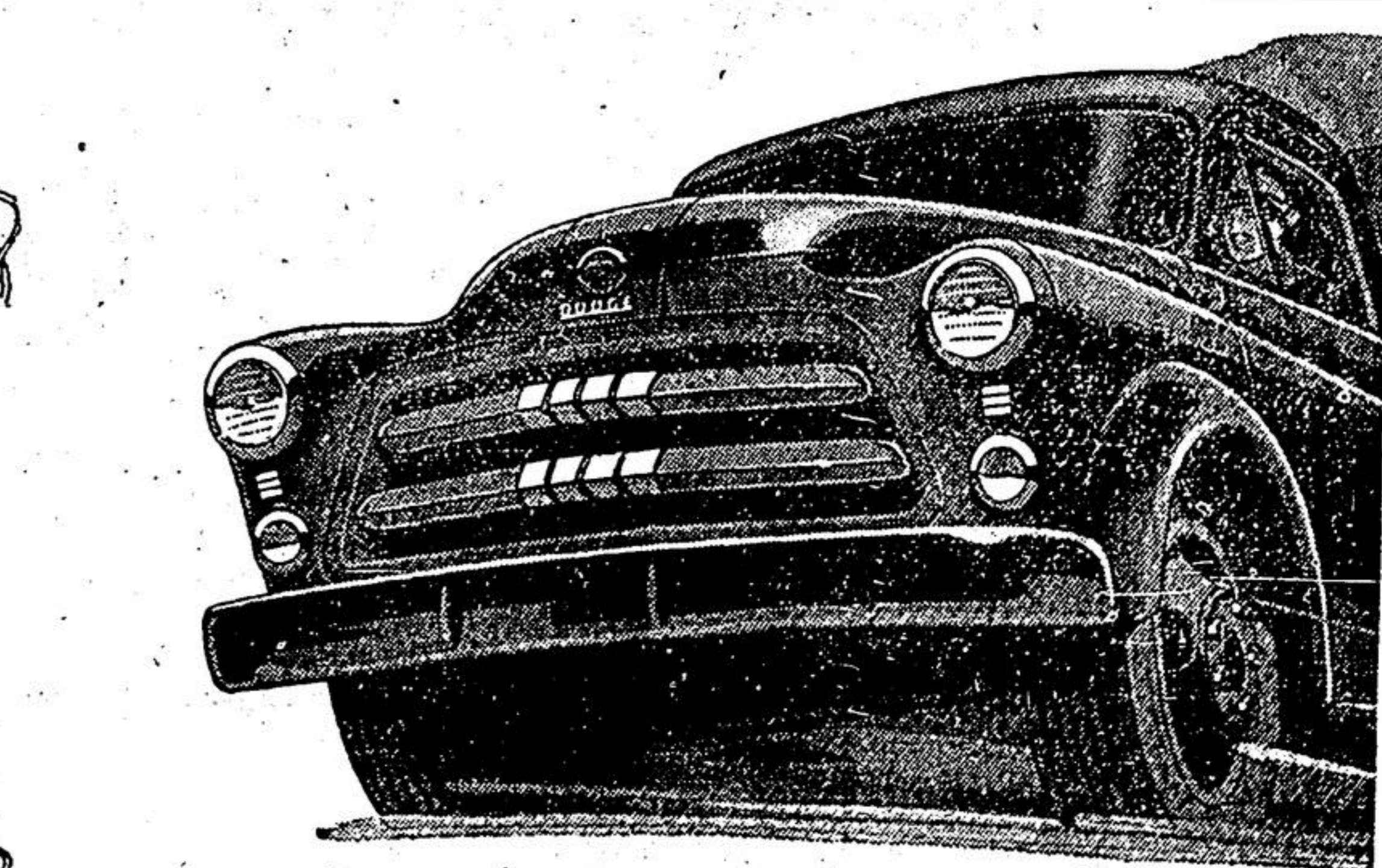
