

Dr. Richard L. Hearn New Chairman of Ontario Hydro

Recognized internationally as one of Canada's most eminent professional engineers, Dr. Richard Lankaster Hearn was appointed Ontario Hydro's Gen-



eral Manager and Chief Engineer in March, 1947. Since first joining Hydro more than 40 years ago, he has been associated with many of the Commission's major undertakings. As Hydro's senior executive, he has played a lead-

ing role in the Commission's unprecedented power expansion program, embracing major hydro-electric projects and Canada's largest steam generating installations. Lately, he has applied his wide experience to studies of the future possibilities of producing electrical energy from atomic energy.

Born May 18, 1890, in Toronto, Dr. Hearn is the son of Dr. Richard Hearn and Ellen Jane French Hearn. His early education was received at St. Albans School, Toronto.

Dr. Hearn's notable career dates back to 1913, the year in which he graduated from the University of Toronto as a Bachelor of Applied Science and obtained employment with Ontario Hydro. His first Commission project was as designer of the Wasdells Falls power plant. Later, he became supervisor of designing and drafting on the Queenston - Chippawa project, at one time the largest hydro-electric plant in the world and now renamed the Sir Adam Beck-Niagara Generating Station No. 1. In 1918, he was appointed Hydro's Assistant Engineer on Construction.

Dr. Hearn gained valuable experience in the United States, when, in 1921, he accepted the position of Assistant Chief Engineer with the Washington Water Power Company, Spokane. Three years later, he returned to Canada as Chief Engineer and Secretary-Treasurer of H.G. Acres and Com-

School Expense Shifting to Urban Dwellers

At a meeting of the Markham Township Public School Trustees Association at Unionville on Monday night, Mr. Maynard Hallman, Inspector of Public Schools, discussed with members how the new increase in property assessment in the Township of Markham will affect the Provincial grants to schools in 1955. He pointed out that a study of available figures would indicate that the tax burden to cover educational costs in Markham, is shifting from the farmer to the small land owner.

A survey made by Mr. Hallman shows that the increase in assessment is greatest where population density is greatest, suggesting that small land owners are going to pay a greater proportion of the cost of education.
