Clary Payne, Orillia's veteran hockey star has been named the town's "Athlete of the Year." The actual presentation will be made early this month. Payne was chosen not only for his hockey ability, but also for his keen participation in lacrosse and softball. He is also an ardent swimmer. Other men who received honorable mention were Bob Shropshire, Orillia Pontiac netminder and Gander Rose, a former hockey goalie and a fine ball player. Although Payne has not seen much hockey action this winter due to a fractured ankle, he gained considerable prominence last season when he topped the team in the goalscoring department: The first winner of the trophy was an ex-Stouffville hockey star, Earl McCrone, back in 1952.

THREE TEAMS MOVE OUT

On Friday night the Stouffville arena was literally humming with action and yet there wasn't a single player on the ice. At seven o'clock the Clippers embarked for a Senior game at Orillia, the Midgets left for a contest at Uxbridge and the Juniors journeyed over to Nobleton for a game with the Combines.
