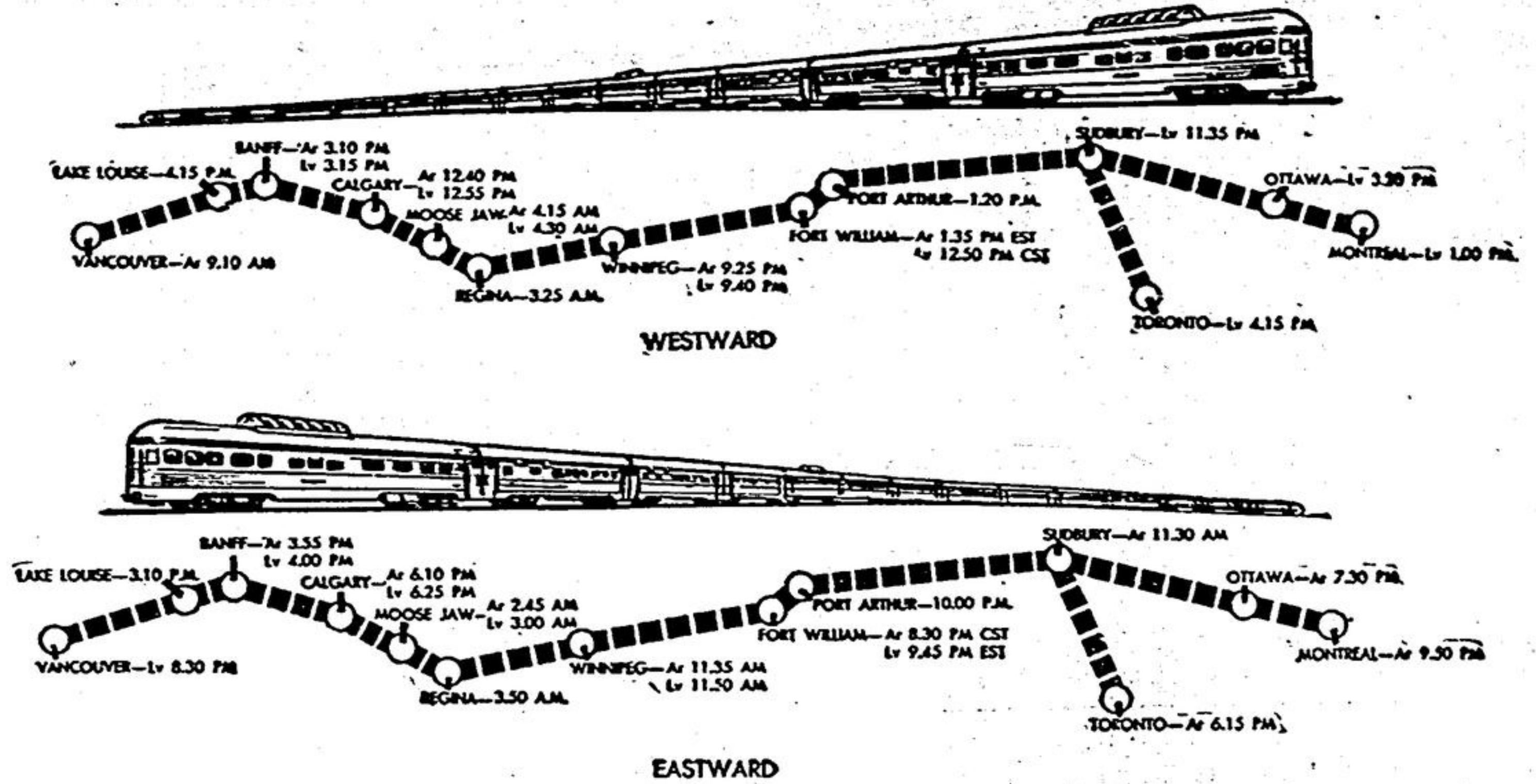

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAYS SPANS CANADA IN THREE NIGHTS



This diagram illustrates the schedule which the Canadian Pacific Railway's new "dome" streamliner, "The Canadian" will follow to cross Canada in three nights travelling time when the stainless steel train goes into

service on April 21. Under the new schedule, Sudbury will be a mere six hours and 15 minutes out of Toronto; there will be only one night on the train between Montreal or Toronto and Winni-

peg; Calgary will be little more than an overnight hop from Winnipeg; and Vancouver will be reached early in the morning of the fourth day. "The Canadian", powered by diesel locomotives, will

feature: Skyline coaches with reclining chairs equipped with head rests and full-length leg rests, which are reserved without extra charge, scenic dome-coach-coffee shops in which meals or snacks can be obtained at popular prices, luxurious dining room cars, "Manor" and "Chateau" sleeping cars with a wide variety of accommodations; and the fascinating new scenic dome lounge cars.
