tion of such a Committee for years and eventually gave in this year, but the Cabinet was careful to hedge the Committee in with narrow terms of reference, limited powers, and a Government majority and Chairman. They have already refused to give this Committee power to send for "persons, papers and things," and for any persons who they may think, as witnesses, would be an added help to the Commit-

We have been having some interesting times on the Estimates Committee, however. The first Department to be discussed by the Committee has been the Department of Citizenship and Immigration. It has given the Members of this Committee an opportunity to question the Minister and the heads of his Department on the functions of the Department. We have been advised that immigrants from behind the Iron Curtain must wait for a period of two years of probation in the Free Zones of Europe before their applications are accepted for permission to enter Canada. This period is set aside as a time in which the Government can probe the applicant's past.

It was brought to light that prospective immigrants to Canada are not questioned about their religious faith and that Canada has no numerical immigration quotas except for India, Pakistan and Ceylon, with whom it has agreements.

Most Members of Parliament are now reconciled that this will not be one of the shorter parliamentary sessions.
