**Residents Ask Speed Limit at Bloomington**

Residents of Bloomington on the 9th concession are considerably concerned over alleged fast-driving by trucks which travel this road in large numbers and by a fully signed petition requested Whitechurch Township Council on Thursday night to limit the speed there to 30 miles an hour. A deputa-tion waited on council some time ago, alarmed over possible danger to the school children, many of whom must cross this road.

On Thursday night council instructed the clerk to prepare a bylaw to invoke the 30-mile limit. The bylaw must go to the Dept. of Highways for final approval and council expressed the opinion that it was doubtful if the Department would sanction the speed limit as the requirements for a built-up area in such cases, could not be met.
