An analysis of local weather conditions over the past forty percent of all conversions take years for which records are available, shows that it never has been below zero in April. Only once did the mercury drop to zero. That was April 1, 1923.



Not that April temperatures are as consistent as the foregoing figures would indicate. Over the 40 years the April maximum averages have ranged from 42 in 1933 to 61 in 1941. Average minimum reading was as low as'27 in April 1926 and as high as 38 in 1941.

And how do April and March temperatures compare? Well' during the past 10 years April has been 12 degrees milder. The April mean maximum (at 53.4) has been 13.6 degrees warmer than the March average of 39.8 The minimum average (at 33.4) has been 9.9 degrees milder than the March 23.5 average.

April showers really aren't too copious, the records show. Last year's 4.78-inch rainfall was second highest on record for April. There was a five-inch rain in April 1933. But generally the April rain measurement is two or three inches. April often has a few inches of snow too-as late as April 21. Heaviest late snowfall on record was 12 inches on April 10, 1939.
