energetic international group will help to mould a good community life for its citizens. Here we see President Murray Sandford accepting the charter for the Agincourt Club.

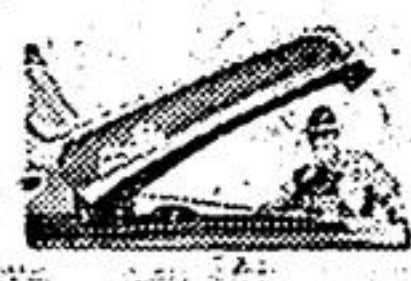
GREEN RIVER

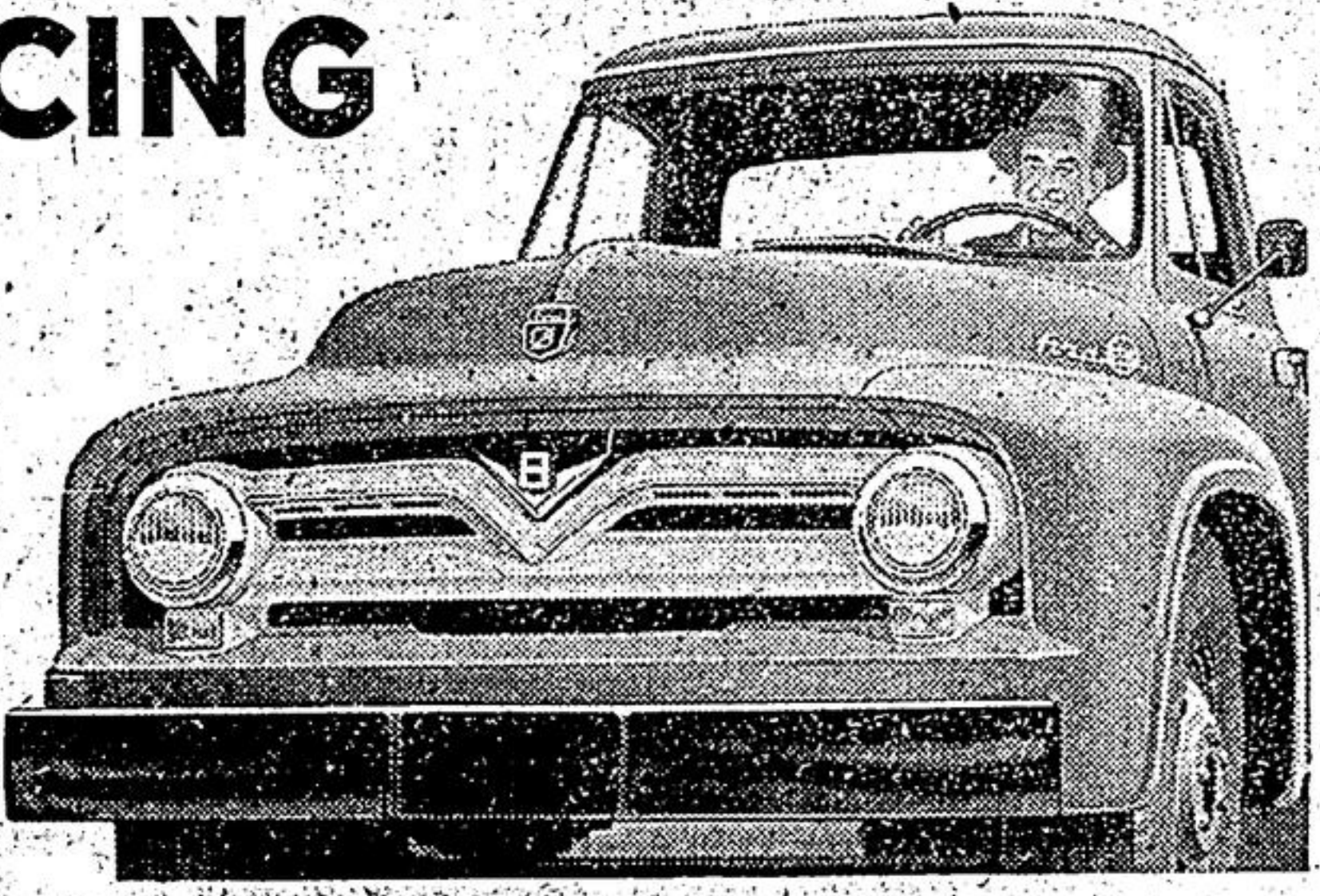
