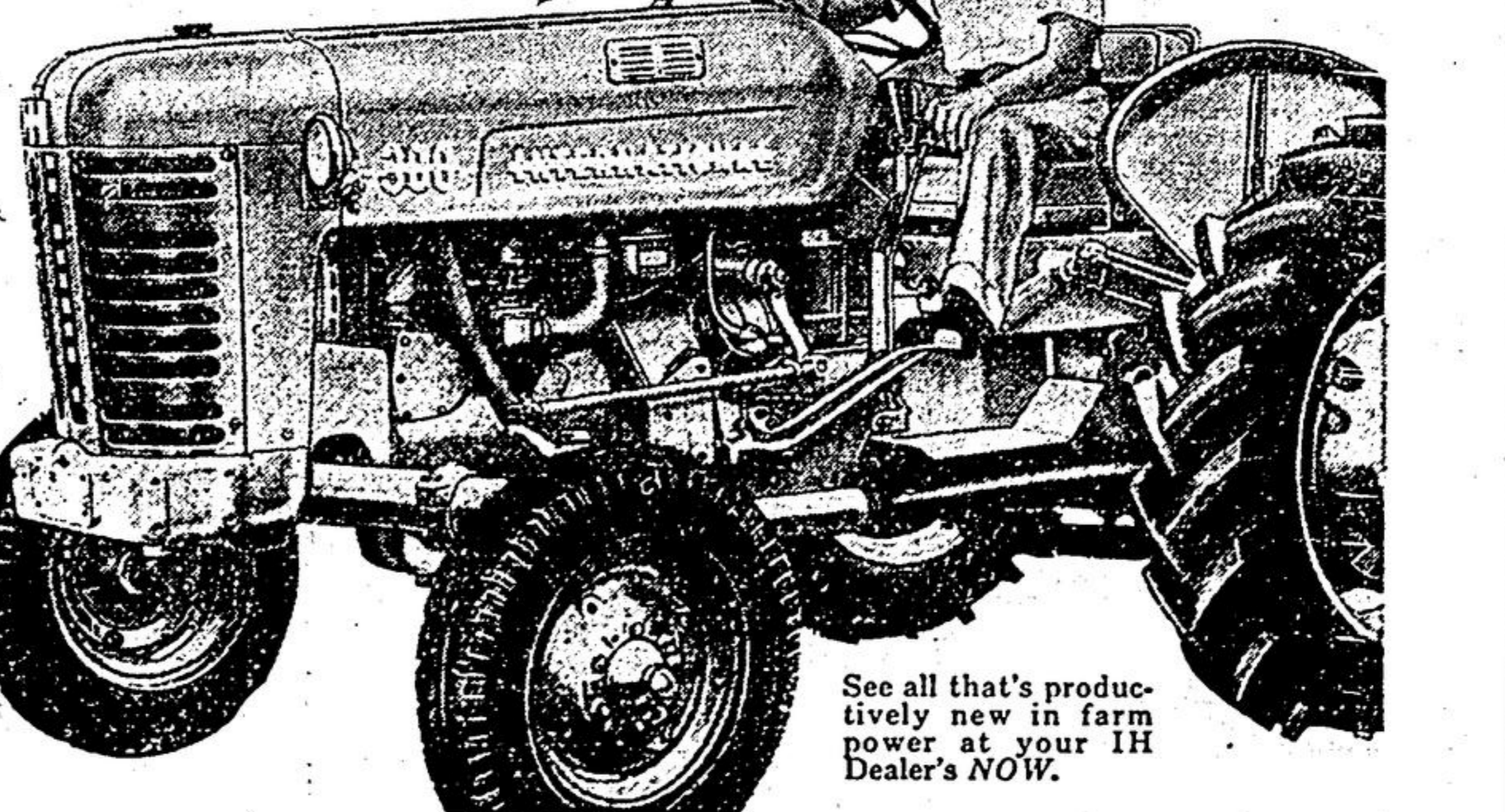
GOODWOOD

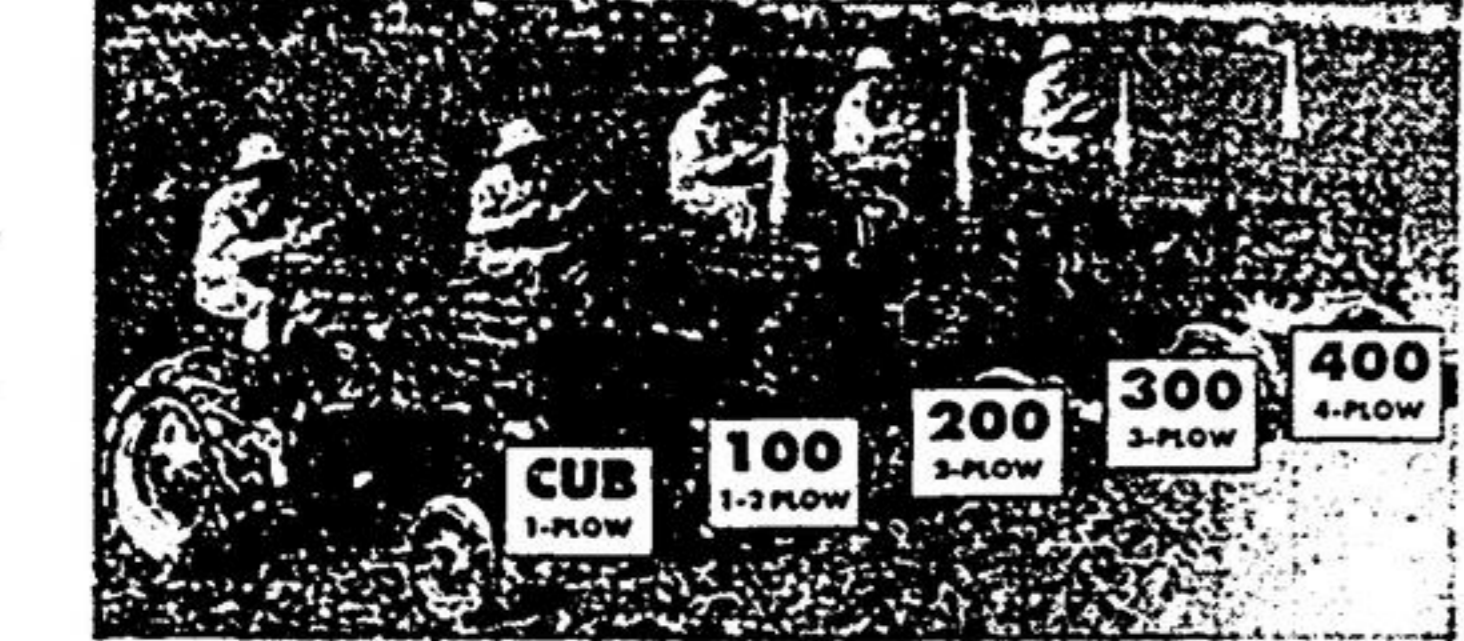
