Planting Operations Started at Vivian Bush

Spring tree planting operations are the main activities on Crown Land adjoining Highway 400.

In the Simcoe-Dufferin Zone planting operations started on April 13 with some 40,000 to 50,000 trees already planted in the Drury Forest. Some frost still remains in the ground and most of the planting to date is being carried out by mechanical equipment. Present spring operations will include plantings at the six County Forests in this Zone as well as in the Grand Valley Authority, totaling in all nearly 450,000 trees. Approximately half of the trees are white and red pine with smaller quantities of white spruce and other species. According to reforestation staff present weather conditions are very favourable for survival but frequent rains have made working conditions difficult.

Shelley CCF Candidate in North York
