As to the matter of attempt-

the municipality in order to  
protect the Observatory, Reeve  
A. LeMasurier seemed to echo  
the sentiments of Council when  
he stated, "I am prepared to  
protect the Observatory to the  
extent that such protection  
does not adversely affect the  
municipality."

The Water Committee (Coun-  
cillors D. Deacon and V. Griffin)  
will shortly meet with rep-  
resentatives of Thornhill Es-  
tates subdivision in order to  
discuss the matter of a water  
supply for the development.  
The subdivision, which lies on  
lots 11 and 12 in Concession 3,  
is outside the proposed water  
area. The plan of the subdivi-  
sion was forwarded to Council  
by the Planning Board after  
Council recently halted all sub-  
division development until the  
matter of water is clarified.

The Planning Board has also  
recommended that the 290-  
acre Victoria Gardens be  
located just west of the Vil-  
lages of Unionville be forward-  
ed to the Department of Plan-  
ning and Development for  
study.

Council has turned down a  
further request from the Im-  
perial Oil Co. for permission to  
build a service station on the  
southwest corner of the Don  
Mills Road and the Carrville

tery in the floodlight opener.

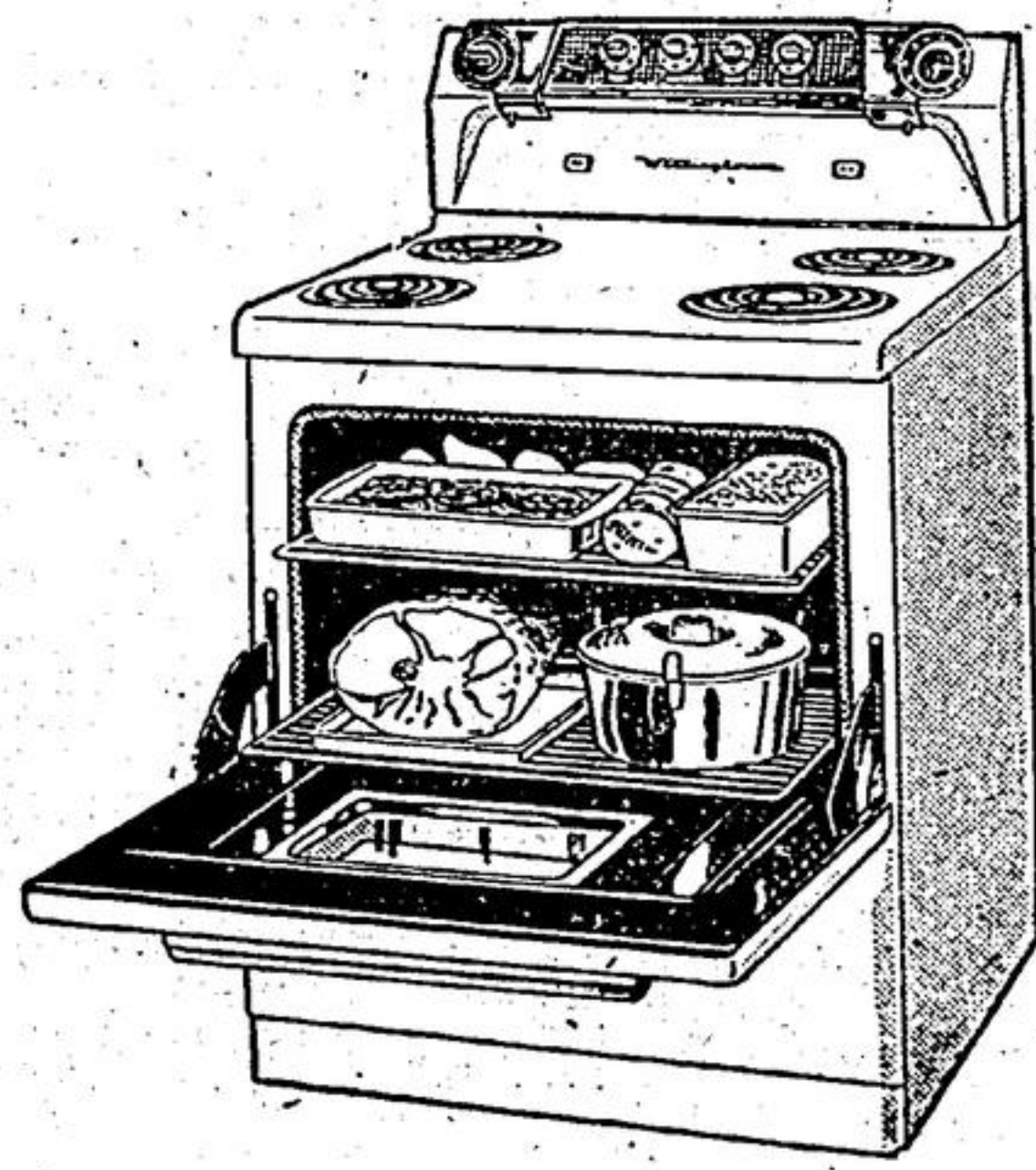

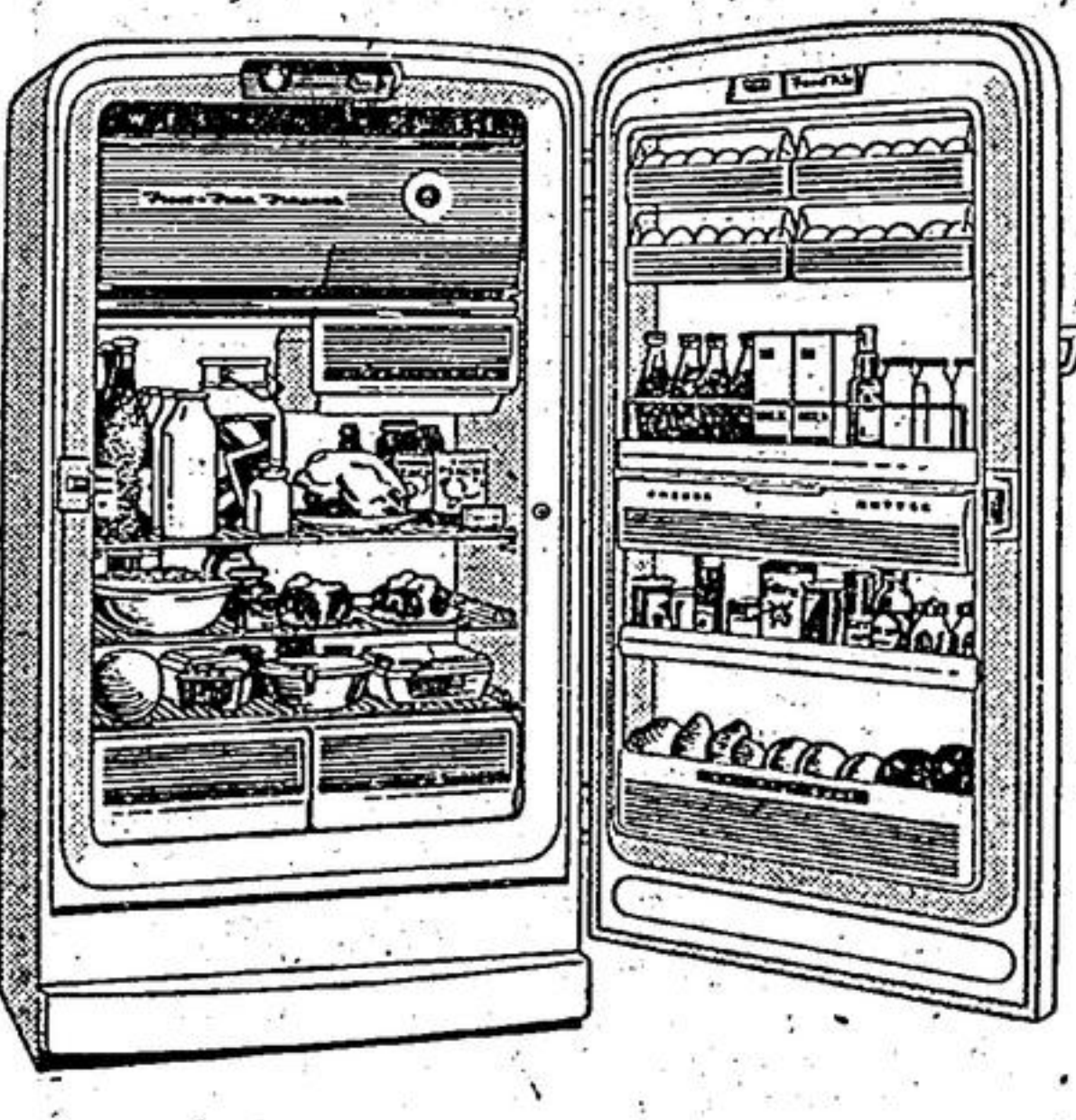
