Whitevale Youth, 22 Is Killed in Car Crash

William Lawson is Member of Pioneer Pickering Family



Young, capable and energetic, William Lawson, who will carry the Liberal Banner in Oshawa riding during the coming provincial election, is a man whose family tree has its roots deep in Pickering Township.

Community spirit has been a trademark of Mr. Lawson's family since the day in 1840 when his great-grandfather, a settler, landed by boat at the mouth of Duffin's Creek.

The Liberal candidate's father, however, was a printing salesman whose business took him to Toronto. And it was there, in 1924, that William Lawson was born. He attended Whitney Public School and received his secondary school education at UTS in Toronto.

Later, Mr. Lawson enrolled at the University of Toronto, and while there he met and married the former Bridget Elizabeth Gregson, a native of Dorset, England, who came to Canada as a war guest in 1940. Their marriage took place in Deer Park Church in 1946. Mr. Lawson graduated from U. of T. with a bachelor of arts degree in 1947, and entered Osgoode Hall to study law. In 1950 he was called to the bar and admitted to practice as a solicitor.

While a student at Osgoode Hall, Mr. Lawson was articled to the legal firm of Taylor and Joy. He maintained this association after graduation, and in 1951 became a partner in the firm which is now known as Taylor, Joy, Baker and Lawson.

Mr. and Mrs. Lawson, who now are the parents of an active five-year-old son, Hugh, and a charming daughter, Hillary, 3, moved from Toronto to Pickering. Their home, a rambling, 110-year-old structure, was built by Squire Green, one of the Township's leading citizens in its early days. The village of Greenwood, near which it is located, was named after him.

Also resident in Pickering Township are Mr. Lawson's mother and brother, who are both active in church and community organizations, and his

uncle, who has operated a bartending business there for the past 20 years.

The Liberal candidate's first political step came with his election to Pickering Township council in 1952. He has been re-elected each year since then. The last election, when he led the poll, gave some idea of Mr. Lawson's popularity.

The Lawson family are members of St. George's Anglican Church in Pickering. Mrs. Lawson, besides playing the role of wife and mother, devotes much of her time to the church's Women's Auxiliary and the Women's Missionary Society. She is also a prominent member of the Pickering Women's Institute.
