**BEGINS 10TH YEAR**

The local Tri-County Baseball League has commenced its tenth year of operation. In its nine year history, the league has provided recreation and entertainment for a vast group of sports enthusiasts.

Starting as a team league in 1946, it grew to a 17 team circuit in 1949. The ten charter teams in 1946 included Cambray, Cameron, Little Britain, Valenta, Lindsay, Cannington, Sunderland, Woodville, Bolsover and Manilla. In 1947 Oakwood and Beaverton joined the group and Sutton and Port Perry swelled the ranks to fourteen teams in 1948. The following year Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Sonya and Stouffville were added and Cannington amalgamated with Manilla.

In 1953 the league was split and a number of the smaller hamlets formed an Independent League. They have continued to operate in their own closely knit group. This year, Sutton amalgamated with Sunderland and Newmarket entered the Tri-County for the first time since 1926.

**NEW RECRUITS**

The Stouffville Red Sox are sticking to home town talent this season. The management has signed three additional stars to the lineup who have not performed under the local colors in past years. Don Haynes, reliable catcher with the Juvenile ball club last summer will share the receiving chores with Hal Gibson. The homesters were forced to come from behind in both games to chalk up the early-season victories. Lorne Schell handled the mound chores for the Red Sox in both contests with Geo. Holborne, ex-Sutton hurler, on the hill for Sunderland.

**Red Sox 5, Sunderland 4**  
A single blow by catcher Hal Gibson in the seventh inning drove in Lorne Schell with the winning run as Stouffville squeezed out a 5-4 win here on Monday night. The Red Sox were trailing 4-3 when Bob Hassard opened the seventh with a double. Ken Schell was a strike-out victim but Hassard moved to third when an attempted pick-off throw from the catcher went astray. Lorne Schell received a life when Pearson in right field misjudged his long fly ball and Gibson clouted in the winning run with a drive into centre field.

Geo. Holborne was a steady performer on the mound for the visitors and allowed but six hits throughout the entire nine innings. He struck out twelve batters and issued six walks. Lorne Schell was clipped for ten hits, struck out ten and walked five.

The Red Sox broke into an early lead in the first inning. Bud Lehman received a base on balls and Ken Schell brought him around with a single.

Stouffville were held off the score sheet until the fifth inning when Hassard romped home with his team's second run. Geo. Stark, a new recruit, added to the Stouffville lineup this season, teed off and smashed a solid double into the outfield in the sixth and scored when Les Clarkes fly ball was muffed in centre field. Clarke was later tagged out at the plate when he attempted to steal home.

Geo. Holborne was the most potent batter for Sunderland with three doubles in five trips to the plate. He scored two of his team's four runs. Harold Woodward drove in two runs with a two-base clout in the 4th inning. Bill Lennox called the game behind the plate.
