Propose an East-West Highway Thru County

York County Council has decided to ask the Ontario Government for an east-west provincial highway in the area.

Approximately 40 miles in length, the highway would link Highway 9 at Schomberg with Highway 7 near Greenbank. Chairman Alfred LeMasurier, reeve of Markham Township, presented the resolution at the recommendation of the special roads committee.

It was explained there was no east-west highway across the county north of Highway 7 and it was felt the new highway would relieve congestion. A copy of the resolution is being forwarded to the County of Ontario, in which a section of the proposed route lies.
